## reorgetown Will Licence lumbers, Inspect This Work

Seorgetown council , took a move raids tightening restrictions on mmbing installations on Monday hen they gave first readings to three which would impose certain digations on tradesmen in this line

The by-laws are similar to those hick have been already adopted in Ontarto towns. Responsibility their enforcement will rest with e county bealth unit.

One by-law requires master plumers and journeymen to be licenced, title annual fees of \$5 and \$2 for conce renewals. A Plumbers Regisration Board would be set up, with athority to cancel a license if the alder is shown to be incompetent or be guilty of a second wilful violaion of provincial regulations.

Another by law makes regulations or contractors installing drains and optic tanks.

Third by-law sets up a scale of insection fees. A \$10 charge will be made for buildings with five fixtures w less plus \$1.00 for each additional fature. Apartments pay a rate of \$10 for one suite, plus \$7.00 fo reach addi-

Owners now have received their payments to rthe portions which were purchased by the Dept. of Highways, and it is possible for the sidewalk to be put in the proper location, but road chairman Allan Norton said he would prefer to wait until there is fill available from other projects where the town will be excavating.
