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WHAT COUNCIL DID

Georgetown Will Licence Plumbers, Inspect This Work

Georgetown council took a move towards tightening restrictions on plumbing installations on Monday when they gave first readings to three by-laws which would impose certain obligations on tradesmen in this line of work.

The by-laws are similar to those which have been already adopted in other Ontario towns. Responsibility for their enforcement will rest with the county health unit.

One by-law requires master plumbers and journeymen to be licensed, with annual fees of \$5 and \$2 for license renewals. A Plumbers Registration Board would be set up, with authority to cancel a license if the holder is shown to be incompetent or to be guilty of a second willful violation of provincial regulations.

Another by-law makes regulations for contractors installing drains and septic tanks.

Third by-law sets up a scale of inspection fees. A \$10 charge will be made for buildings with five fixtures or less plus \$1.00 for each additional fixture. Apartments pay a rate of \$10 for one suite, plus \$7.00 for each additional.

"We'll soon be inspected to death," remarked councillor Thos. L. Lyons, who mildly protested the new by-laws.

"Inspected to life would be a better term," said Reeve Stan Allen, whose committee suggested the by-laws.

The idea to protect home builders and I think it will be the best ten dollars a home builder can invest to get an inspector's advice."

Deputy Reeve Allan Norton, who also strongly favours the by-law said it is similar to regulations affecting electricians and will be a good thing

An Ashgrove farmer until he retired and moved to Georgetown in 1939, Daniel F. Wright, 80, was buried in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval last Wednesday.

Mr. Wright died in Guelph General Hospital July 18th where he had been a patient for ten days.

Son of John and Jane Howden Wright, he was born on their farm near Silvercreek. His father moved to Lot 9, 7th Lane, when he was a boy and he attended Ashgrove Public School, then farmed with his father. He later had a farm on the 8th Line, then returned to the home farm when his brother Robert was killed in a railway crossing accident many years ago.

He was a faithful member of Ashgrove United Church and was made a life elder there. After moving to Georgetown, Mr. and Mrs. Wright became members of St. John's United Church in town. They made their home at 73 Maple Ave. W.

He is survived by his wife, Eva M. McPhail. Besides his brother, Robert, he was predeceased by a sister Jane who died when she was a child.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Will Decide Sidewalk Construction Next Week

Appearance of Gerard Wilcox at Monday's council meeting to ask when sidewalks are planned for east Guelph Street spurred some action on sidewalk construction with a promise to act at next week's meeting.

The sidewalk which will serve several new houses, Isom No. 7 High way has been stalled for two years because of a number of technicalities involving ownership of the land. Owners now have received their payments to the portions which were purchased by the Dept. of Highways, and it is possible for the sidewalk to be put in the proper location, but road chairman Allan Norton said he would prefer to wait until there is fill available from other projects where the town will be excavating. The other alternative is to buy put run gravel, which he thinks is too costly.

Reeve Stan Allen opposed any further delay, saying residents have been given the run-around for two years through no fault of council, and now when it is possible to proceed, council should not themselves delay. He favours buying gravel for a sidewalk base and using clay fill which will turn up when the highway is resurfaced and widened, on Maple Avenue. Cr. Irwin Noble supported the Reeve and council decided next week to decide what sidewalks will be put in this year.

A by-law will be introduced at the same time for constructing a sidewalk on the east side of Union Street from Durham to King, as requested by property owners.

A decision will also be made on an improvement for Dr. A. McAllister's driveway on Main Street. Engineer Wilson estimated a \$500 expenditure for lowering and installing a stretch of new walk and cutting down a large tree, which is the only solution for the driveway problem.

It would cost \$2200 to properly fence the entire sewer pump house property, Mr. Wilson reported, and council turned over this problem to the property committee for study.

Cr. Harry Hale is worried about the property not being safeguarded and said council might be in a tricky position if there was an accident to children who sometimes enter the property.

Others thought that with the future possibly bringing a major change in the sewage disposal plant, it would be money wasted to fence the present property.

Council vetoed selling the old pump house property on Normandy Blvd. as this is a natural water course.

Police on Alert For Park Vandals

Police are keeping a watchful eye on the park these days, where vandals have inflicted further damage on the rest rooms installed by the Chamber of Commerce and the town council a few years ago.

Windows have been broken in the building, a Yale lock smashed on one door and toilets plugged in one part of the building.

The damage is being repaired under the guidance of the town engineer, and council warns that if anyone is caught damaging the building, there will be court action taken.
