Avro Employees Gain 3 Cents Now, 5 later

A contract agreement reached between Avro Canada Ltd. and the union committee that negotiates for ten thousand hourly rated employees enabled both sides to leave the bargaining table with satisfaction.

Workers many of whom are Georgetown and district residents, gained a package deal in wage increases and fringe benefits amounting to nearly 10 cents an hour.

The company won a two year period of stability and the hope that improved relations between management and workers may end the pres-

ent union-enforced ban on overtime. Beginning now, all hourly rated employees will get a 3 cent-an-hour pay increase. This is retroactive to April 15, expiry date of the last contract.

The present one cent cost of living bonus will be incorporated into the basic wage rate from July 30, 1955.

The company has also offered 'to pay the full cost of the existing group insurance plan (to which employees now contribute) and to introduce in 1956, at no cost to employees, an improved group insurance plan

This is a comprehensive welfare plan that will include benefits equivalent to Physicians' Services and Blue Cross schemes.

The agreement is between lodges 717 of the International Association of Machinists, AFL (turbo and aircraft) and Avro's 2 subsidiary plants at Malton, Avro Aircraft Ltd and Orenda Engines Ltd.

A stumbling block in negotiations has been the union's insistence on one master agreement and a desire on the part of the parent company to divide administration between the aircraft and the engine companies

A compromise has been reached in which the master agreement covers both companies but is subject in certain respects to separate administra-

Crawford Gordon, president and general manager of Avro Canada, said last night he felt the new contract "will be good for the employees and the companies."

He stressed the fact that the agreement had been reached not through the medium of a conciliation board but by a proposal made by the company to the negotiating committee.

Total benefits, in a full year, will cost the companies more than \$200,-

Employess will receive hourly rates from \$1.48 to \$2.30 for a 40-hour week. A company official said this will place Avro and Orenda employees in the top wage bracket of Canadian heavy manfacturing.

When the union first opened discussion with management in February it asked increases ranging from. 7 to 14 cents an hour.

Church Names Charters Full-Time Publicity Man
