

Landscape Changes as New Delrex Area Takes Shape

Preliminary work is well towards completion in the Delrex subdivision. The general plan for the whole area has been approved by the Dept. of Planning and Developments, and over 500 acres has been registered at Milton.

Water and sewer lines are almost completed on the H. Craig Reid property which will see the first building in the development, and this work will continue on the other farm properties.

Every day sees familiar landmarks disappear as the huge building undertaking gets going. The Wilbert Cleave property has entirely disappeared, with the barn razed and the house moved across the highway onto the Reid farm. The Gilchrist house has been moved to a new site on the Emslie farm. Other barns have disappeared and several of the farm houses are being used by parts of the Heclop organization.

Three families are still living in the houses which have been purchased by Delrex. Mr. and Mrs. William Finnie, Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Craig Reid and Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Reid will not be moving out till later this year. Others have moved. Mr. and Mrs. Wilbert Cleave to a new farm, Mr. and Mrs. George Cleave to town, and the Campbell Sinclairs to Lamehous, Mr. and Mrs. Will Reid to a new home north of town and H. Craig Reid to his Milton farm.

OUTDOOR SERVICE AT LOWVILLE PARK

The outdoor church service sponsored by the Halton Federation of Agriculture, held in the Halton Community Centre was well attended. The Milton Band provided sacred music and gave leadership to the hymn singing which preceded the service.
