

Driving while Intoxicated

IMPRISONMENT

**SUSPENSION OF LICENCE** 

1st offence -- 7 days to 3 months 2nd offence-I month to I year

6 months to 3 years .. I year to 3 years

3rd offence-3 months to I year 1 year to 3 years In addition to these penalties, the car will be impounded for three months.

## Driving while Ability is Impaired by Alcohol or Drugs

BUSPENSION OF LICENCE 1st offence -3 months and/or \$50 to \$500 and 3 months to 3 years 2nd offence-14 days to 3 months and 3 months to 3 years 3rd offence-3 months to 1 year 3 months to 3 years
