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BRITAIN TO TAKE SURPLUS CHEESE

Speaking to the Frontense County Holstein Breeders Club at Kingston on July 14th, Everett Biggs, Dairy Commissioner for Ontario said: "The United Kingdem government has approved the sum of approximately four million dollars for the import of Canadian cheddar cheese from July 1st, 1966 to June 30th, 1956. In my opinion this will be enough to clear the surplus production above domestic requirements in Canada for that peri-

Mr. Biggs made this announcement at what was characterized as "Operation Moo" by the staff at Old Fort Henry, Kingston. A group of Holstein cattle invaded the Fort for the evening and Holstein breeders numbering 400 accompanied them. "David" the goat who is mascot at Old Fort Henry greeted each visiting bovine at a special ceremony, the guard paraded with the fife and drum band in authentic' historical costume and cannon boomed a salute.

Mr. Biggs stated that the first steps had been taken to make Kemptville Agricultural School cheddar cheese research centre for the province of Ontario. Prof. Owen Irvine, formerly of the Ont. Agricultural College at Guelph and recognized as one of the outstanding research men on cheese in Canada, has been appointed to head this centre. A top dairy bacteriologist will be appointed to work with Professor Irvine.

John Powell, of the Holstein Friesian Association of Canada, reported that G. M. Clemons, secretary manager of the Association had just returned from Europe feeling optimistic about the future prospects for sale of top Canadian Holsteins there. Last

winter the first shipment of Holsteins to Spain took place and a repeat order has now been secured. The herd of close of 1,000 head of Canadian Holsteins being maintained by County Marzotto near Venice is providing favourable publicity for our cattle and the prospects are that more business will be coming from Italy. In Great Britain the trend is toward a more dairy-like animal and definite interest is being shown in the possibility of importing Canadian Holsteins. Mr. Clemons was impressed with the profitable sideline of raising Holstein steers that has been developed by the Britishers and was inclined to think that our Canadian breeders should look closely at the possibilities involved.

Mr Powell stated that during the first six months of 1955 a total of 42,113 purebred Holsteins have been registered. This is the largest total in the association's history for a simtlar period and represents a 7 per cent increase over the first six months of 1954. Transfers of owner-Mr. Crawford, a tinsmith by trade, ship were up 7 per cent and exports
