**Will Use 150 Tons of
Food at Jamboree**

When more than 11,000 Boy Scouts gather at Niagara-on-the-Lake for the World Jamboree, August 18-28, they will consume approximately 150 tons of dairy foods, according to Dairy Farmers of Canada. In fact, one third of all the food provided at meals for the scouts will be Canadian dairy foods, part of which has been made possible by the direct grant of Canadian dairy producers and operators.

When it became apparent that there might not be enough butter to go around, various segments of the dairy industry rectified the deficiency. Dairy organizations participating were: The Alberta Dairy Farmers' Assoc., The Saskatchewan Dairy Association, Dairy Manufacturers Assoc. of Manitoba, La Co-operative Federée de Québec, The Montreal Milk Producers' Assoc., Co-operative Agricole de Granby, The Ontario Creamery Assoc., The Ontario Cheese Producers' Marketing Board, The Ontario Concentrated Milk Producers' Marketing Board, The Ontario Cream Producers' Marketing Board, The Ontario Whole Milk Producers' League.

The breakfast menus for the scouts will use the following amounts of dairy foods: butter, 17,000 lbs.; package cheese, 3,000 lbs.; grated cheese, 3,000 lbs.; milk, 110,000 qts. and 50,000 half pints; ice cream, 937 pounds. It is anticipated that much greater quantities of ice cream, whole milk and chocolate milk will be consumed by the scouts at the canteens.



MAIDEN VOYAGE NEXT SPRING: Hundreds of workers, representing dozens of specialized trades, are putting the finishing touches on the 24,000-ton Canadian Pacific liner "Empress of Britain" in readiness for her maiden voyage in the Spring of 1956. Launched June 22nd by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth at Govan on the River Clyde, the newest of the Great White Empress fleet is now being outfitted at the quayside. Of modern design, the vessel will carry 1,050 passengers on her North Atlantic travel route between Liverpool and Montreal.

**Conservation Council
Urges Gravel Control**

The Conservation Council of Ontario has forwarded a resolution to the Provincial Government urging special legislation to regulate the mining of sand and gravel.

The Council points out that the exploitation of these materials, as now conducted, leaves unsightly scars on the landscape, tends to accelerate surface erosion and often contributes to stream pollution.

Unless gravel operators are required by law to recondition pits at the conclusion of operations, by approved methods of overfill, regrassing or reforestation, and are compelled to cease polluting rivers with the washings of mud and silt in accordance with existing legislation, the few remaining areas in Southern Ontario suitable for public parkland may be irreparably ruined.

With the unprecedented demand for gravel for highway building and construction purposes generally, and with the exhaustion of more convenient sources of supply, operators are planning to exploit to the full the rich gravel deposits in the Forks of the Credit area and along the Grand River. Both these districts however, offer unique opportunities for recreational development which cannot be duplicated elsewhere. With the rapidly growing population of

Southern Ontario, open spaces for recreation are more urgently needed than ever.

The Conservation Council maintains that the legislation asked for is vital if the needs of essential industrial development are not to conflict with the equally essential need for preserving the amenities of the countryside, especially in areas suitable for public recreation.

**SIXTH ANNUAL SCHOOL
FOR RURAL CLERGY**

More than 50 Ontario clergy, many of them accompanied by their wives, spent this week at the Ontario Agricultural College enrolled in the annual School for Rural Clergy. New York State was also represented.

Enrolled in courses in rural sociology, farm marketing, and nutrition, they spent the week in lectures designed to broaden their knowledge of some of the problems and challenges of rural living. Soil conservation, livestock, and field crop tours and a new course this year dealing with early and modern religious drama were conducted. For the ladies a number of the tours were held and the arrangement of flowers and floral designs studied.

Included among the students were a former Georgetown minister and

his wife, Rev. and Mrs. John Ostrom, now of Clinton, who formerly ministered at First Baptist Church here. District clergymen enrolled included Rev. William Bidwell, Campbellville and Rev. and Mrs. John Province, Streetsville.
