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**Two Seek Licences-as
Taximen Claim Enough**

The taxi business came up for discussion at Monday's council meeting when three local operators asked restrictions on issuing further licences, another operator requesting a licence for a second cab, and another requesting asking for a new licence for himself.

Council first heard Norman Brown, Jack Morrow and Jack Hepburn claim that present cabs in use serve the town adequately and that until Georgetown grows, there isn't enough business for more.

"If I didn't have contracts," claimed Mr. Morrow, "I couldn't keep one car operating."

Mr. Brown said there are four good cars in use now, and that only on rare occasions is there enough call for Mr. Hepburn, who owns two cabs, to use both of these.

Mr. Morrow pointed to restrictions in Streetsville, Brampton and Acton. Mayor Armstrong read by-laws pertaining to taxis, while Deputy Reeve Norton suggested a survey of procedure in other towns.

"I'm a believer in free enterprise," said Mr. Norton, "and I don't like to put a stumbling block in the way of a man entering business. But, we take licence money from operators and they are entitled to some measure of protection too."

Reeve Allen wondered how far Council took the deputy reeve's suggestion.

"I like to see everyone make a fair living," he said "but what would we do if, say, truck owners, fuel dealers or grocers came to us with the same request?"

The mayor expressed a similar vein of thought, reporting he had been told that in Hamilton the number of service stations is restricted.

Council took the deputy reeve's suggestion and instructed the clerk to contact other towns about how they regulate taxi licences.

B. Moran, holder of a taxi licence, and Mr. Burrell, who is entering a form of partnership with him, were also at the meeting and decided to request a licence for a second car, rather than for a new licence. Mr. Burrell said, however, that he would like council to keep his name on file for future consideration for a separate licence.

Next to speak was Bill Booth, a Georgetown resident, who explained that he is leaving the real estate business and wishes to enter the taxi business. His request was deferred until council discusses the matter further after information from other municipalities arrives.

Later in the meeting, at the mayor's suggestion, the clerk was asked to contact insurance men dealing in car insurance, asking them to notify council any time that a taxi operator's insurance is cancelled, in order that the town could, in turn, suspend his licence to operate.
