Brethour Firm Sponsors New Canadian Talent

Riley Brethour, former Georgetowner and his Toronte real estate partner Gerry Morris, sponsored something unique a week ago Monday when they presented a free summer concert at the CNE bandshell.

Thousands of people; including some from Georgetown, attended an excellent program Music Under the Stars, which featured an orchestra of 45, and a 12 man chorus directed by Ivan Romanoff. Soloists included Jan Rubes, Irede Adrian, winner of Pick the Stars; Dutch singer Hilds Veenstra; Austrian soprano Leopoldine Pichler: Greek vocalist Teresa Stratas

and others. Gerry Marris, who with Riley Brethour presented the concert, says -"There has always been an undercurrent of animosity between the artist and the businessman. The artist may have felt that the businessman was merely an "animated cash register." l'erhaps in some cases this is true, but because a man's day is filled with financial problems it does not necessarily follow that he is blind to beauty and deaf to fine music.

"We feel that Toronto's business men, through their leadership and organizational ability, should take a more progressive and contributory stand in community cultural activities. For our part we are proud to sponsor this musical event.

Mr. Morris pointed out that if the concert is successful "there is no reason why the furthering of drams and music should not be taken up by other companies, both at the spacious shell and in other strategic localities."
