Perhaps in some cases this is true, but because a man's day is filled with financial problems it does not necessarily follow that he is blind to beauty and deaf to fine music.

"We feel that Toronto's businessmen, through their leadership and organizational ability, should take a more progressive and contributory stand in community cultural activities. For our part we are proud to sponsor this musical event.

Mr. Morris pointed out that if the concert is successful "there is no reason why the furthering of drama and music should not be taken up by other companies, both at the spacious shell and in other strategic localities."

He said: "In the Toronto of 1955, with our great diversity of nationalities, customs and cultures, I think it is a healthy state of affairs that we can all share our enjoyment of fine internationally-flavoured music to be presented by Mr. Romanoff and his company.
