**On International Affairs**

**WHAT COUNCIL DID**

**Milton Plumps for New High School**

The contentious question of North Halton high schools came up for discussion Monday at the Georgetown council meeting.

A letter from the public school board of Milton was read requesting that council members attend a meeting in Milton September 7th to discuss sale of the high school there to the public school board. The letter asked that only two members of each council and school board in the five municipalities which comprise the high school district be named as spokesmen. Mayor Jack Armstrong and Reeve Stan Allen will act for Georgetown.

Milton has been trying for some time to arrange transfer of the school, which would be replaced by a brand new high school building. One main argument is that Milton needs a new school and that the government grant structure is such that a new high school could be built with much less municipal funds than could a public school.

The council, Esquusing, Acton and Nasagawya have recorded opposition to the proposal after learning it was discussed by the high school board. Georgetown council has made no public statement on the question.

The 10-year-old high school district has had its share of grief since four municipalities formed it, with Georgetown making a fifth a year later. The original Dept. of Education idea to build one central school at Speyside never met with majority favour. After years of debate, the idea was shelved, a new school built at Acton and additions made to Georgetown and Milton buildings.

Mayor Armstrong expressed himself quite strongly Monday as thinking the district idea as a "cray muddle" which will become worse and worse as the three towns grow.

"We shall certainly go to the meeting in Milton", he said "if only to find the possibilities of getting out of the district and running our own educational affairs."

"It was a failure from the start," said Deputy Reeve Allan Norton, pointing out that a central building was the only reason for having a district.

Walter Biehn, former school board member, was asked for an opinion, and echoed the sentiments of the mayor and reeve. He explained how cumbersome a board is with members coming from five separate places and rarely a full attendance at a meeting.

"One municipality isn't interested in another's problems," he said "and it evolves that each high school is administered by one or two men who still do not possess authority to make decisions without board sanction."

Council decided to seek advice from the government on present grant structure compared with operating separate schools prior to attending the Milton meeting.

"We mustn't forget also" said Mayor Armstrong, "that Georgetown is the second biggest contributor to the district after Esquusing. As the township gets smaller and smaller, we will find Georgetown bearing a larger and larger share of high school financing."

**Clay Hill Students**  
**Bus to Glen Williams**

Eighteen teachers will be in their classrooms in eleven district public schools which are administered by Esquusing School Area on Tuesday when school opens again.

Five teachers are new to the district, while others will be returning to familiar posts. With the school board considering building a new school at Clay Hill, students from S. S. No. 15 will be attending Glen Williams school this term, with transportation arranged by the school board.

Mrs. Albert Presswood, who taught at the school last year, will be at the Stone School this year, which is not included in the area.

Ralph McKewen of last year's Acton public school staff will be principal of the five-room Glen Williams school. He takes over from Margaret Rozel of town who is returning to teach in Etobicoke. Lois Milleham of Stewarttown, who resigned her position at the Bank of Commerce to train as a teacher is also joining the Glen staff. Mrs. Edna Beaumont, Mrs. Nellie Gardiner and Thelma Brown complete that staff.

The Norval staff remains the same, Principal Douglas Copeland, Mrs. J. T. Cascadden and Ora Carsen. At Stewarttown, Mrs. Lealie Giffen and Mrs. Lyla Pollock will again be teaching.

Other teachers again at their same schools are Mrs. W. T. Cromar, Ashgrove; Margaret MacEdward, Waterloo; Mrs. R. Shortill, Blue Mountain; Bruce Stevenson, Dufferin; and Mary Andrews, Milton Heights. The latter school, destroyed by fire last year, is expected to be ready for the opening. Three schools will have new teachers. At Dublin, Patricia McKone comes from Toronto, replacing Miss I. Gibson who has returned to teachers' college to complete her second year. At Bannockburn, Isabelle Ritchie, a Hamilton Teachers' College grad this year replaces Miss G. East. Mrs. M. Simpson left her position at Leesville to join Acton staff, and she is replaced by Hilda Boyer, who previously taught in the Meaford district.
