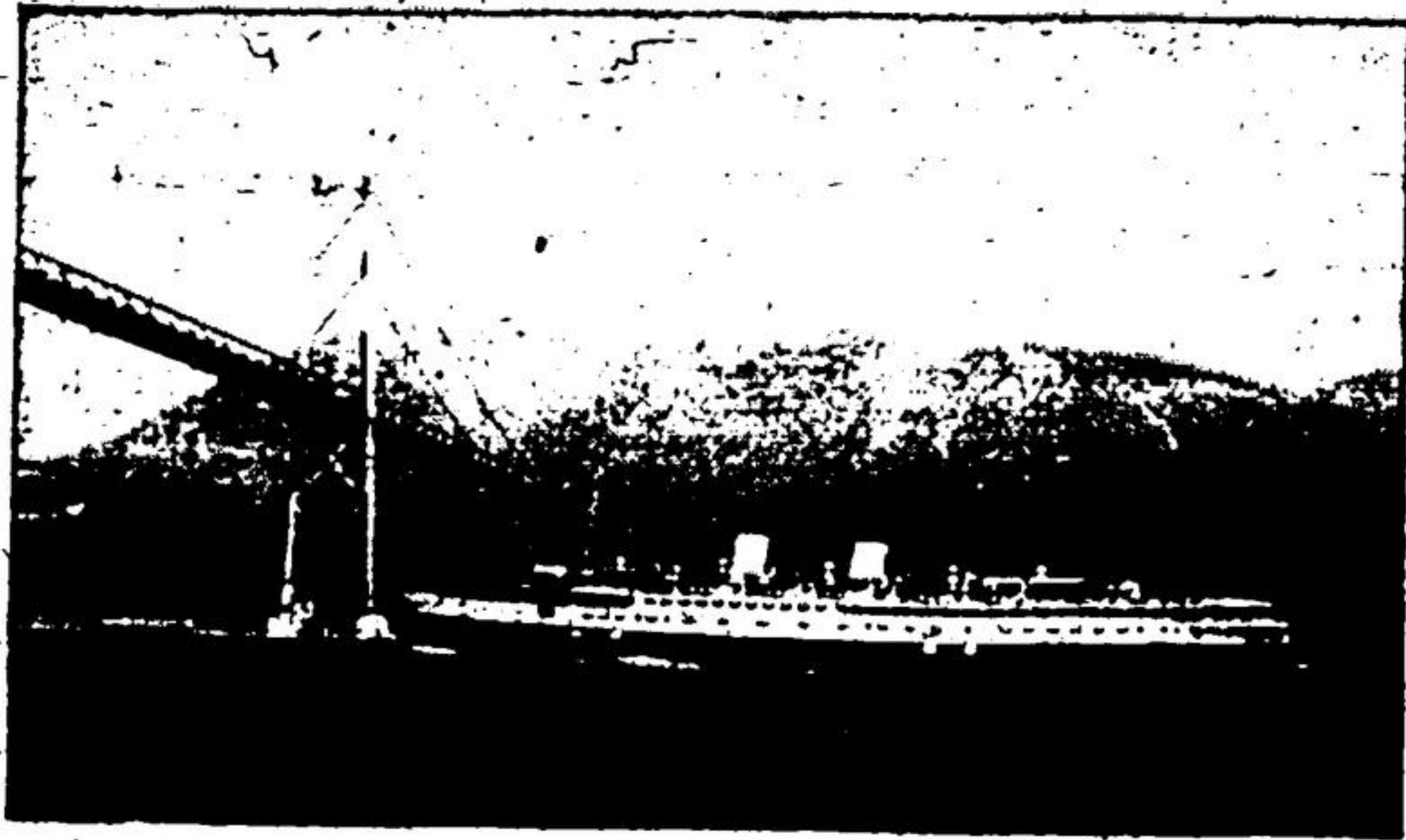

**Harvey Nurse Farm
For Junior Plowmen**

The annual Halton Junior Plowing Match is scheduled for the farm of Harvey Nurse, Ashgrove, on Saturday, September 10th, states John W. Pickett, president of the Halton Juniors. Inasmuch as this annual event features coaching as well as competition in plowing for Juniors, arrangements have been made to have Wilfred Timbers of York County as their chief coach and Judge.

The event on September 10th is sponsored jointly by the Halton Junior Farmers and the Halton Plowmen's Association. Halton Juniors will award a special to the Junior Farmer group which gets out the most entries.

It will be recalled that at the 1954 International at Breslau, Halton won the inter-county tractor event; and in the inter-secondary school competition, the Oakville-Trafalgar High School team placed second, with the North Halton high school team in 5th place. The teams to represent Halton and High School areas at the 1955 International at Leamington will be selected at this Junior event on September 10th.
