WHAY COUNCIL DID

SEEK SOLUTION FOR
GARBAGE DELAYS

Garbage pick-up was discussed at Tuesday's council meeting and Bob Lane, who holds the collection contract will be asked to attend the next council meeting.

Cr. Harry Hale said that a promised Tuesday pick-up after the Monday holiday was advertised last week and in many parts of town it had not been collected. He had had several phone calls that day complaining.

Deputy Reeve Allan Norton said there are often complaints about dogs overturning garbage cans, which is hard to explain because dogs are supposed to be tied up in the summer.

Mayor Armstrong said that, while realizing a growing town makes it difficult for the collector, people are entitled to regular service. Perhaps some changes in picking times are necessary, he said, and this can be discussed with Mr. Lane.

The question of mill waste at Alliance Paper came up again when Reeve Stan Allen produced a bottle which he said contained mosquito "wrappers" taken from land on which he says the waste overflows.

Council suggested that he contact the county health unit, which had previously ruled that the waste is not a health menace.

Cr. Walter Gray presented the police report for August. There were 14 charges and 12 convictions under the highway traffic act, 10 charges and 9 convictions under liquor control act, and 5 convictions, two of them jail sentences, in 6 criminal code charges.

Mr. Gray said that the present campaign against speeding is not designed for monetary profit but to make it safe on local streets. He was aghast, he said, on Monday to see three cars riding abreast down the narrow highway past Harrison's Garage and the police are out to stop this sort of nonsense.
