## Halton Shorthorn Breeders Show the Way at the C.N.E.

When we predicted in our column a week ago that Halton Shorthorn breeders would make it "hot" for their competitors at the Canadian National Exhibition, we spoke more truly than we perhaps realized. To use a slang expression — "Get a load of this." The premier breeders and exhibitor awards, donated by Hays Ltd. were won by S. G. Bennett, of Scotsdale Farm, Georgetown, with a total of 38 points. In the Reserve position, with 37 points, was T. C. Amos, of Moffat; and in third position was W. Harland Merry, of Milton. S. G. Bennett had the Junior and Reserve Junior Champion Females; and his Junior Champion, namely Scotsdale Butterfly Juliette, went on to take the Grand Championship for Females. Scotsdale also had the first prize Get of Sire group, and also first with their Summer Yearling heifer to mention but a few of their most prominent awards.

Tommy Amos and Tiny Merry each brought back at least three red ribbons, which is a real achievement in a Shorthorn Show like that at the 1955 CNE. Amos' Chief, the winning junior yearling bull for T. C. Amos, went on to the Reserve Junior Male Championship. Amos also had the first prize senior bull calf; the first prize heifer calf, not to mention at least a couple of seconds.

W. H. Merry took his red ribbons on his Junior Heifer Calf, his Junior Bull Calf, and his winning group of 3 Calves. Unfortunately, we haven't a complete list of the awards of this great show, but we do know that Reford Gardhouse's Aberfeldy entries were up around the top in most of the classes, and they brought back at least one red ribbon.

### Malden, Ross Hill Prominent

In the Aberdeen Angus show, the entries of both Dr. W. F. James, of Hornby, and J. H. Willmott and Son, of Milton, were both prominent among the prize ribbons. Here again we haven't a complete list of the awards, but we do know that a Dr. James entry took the Reserve Junior Female championship.

### White Faces

In the strong Hereford show, the only Halton exhibitors were Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Patterson, of Norval. While they may not have brought back any red ribbons, five of the six animals were in the prize money, and that is quite an achievement in a show like the CNE.

### Halton Red Polls

When it comes to sweeping the boards clean, you have to hand it to Halton's Red Poll breeders, namely Leonard and George Coulson, A. R. Coulter, and George Headhead. Among them they took all of the championships and nearly all of the top awards.

### Stan May Wins Reserve

Halton used to have many, many prominent horsemen. Today, in so far as the heavy draft breeds are concerned, it is pretty well confined to Stan May, of Hornby, with his Percherons, and Ernie Armstrong, of Georgetown, in the Belgian breed. However, these two Halton horsemen more than upheld the honour of Halton when the judging of the draught horses got under way. Perhaps the top award was the Reserve Junior Male championship, won by Stan May on his 1955 Stallion Foal, Bonny Joe.
