FARM NEWS

MILTON DAIRY SHOW SHOWS MUCH PROMISE

Judging by the entries which rolled in last week at the Agricultural Office in Milton, everything points to another of those outstanding Halton dairy shows at Milton. In the Jersey Ring where Keith Butcher of Princeton will be the officiating judge, 74 Halton Jerseys (101 entries) will parade. Down in the Guernsey ring where Bruce Ulitcher of Cobourg will award the ribbons, 79 head are entered (106 entries.) Bruce S. Beer of Brampton will officiate in the Holstein ring for the second consecutive year. Here 119 head have been entered (153 entries.) Favourable weather prevailing, president Howard Armstrong of the Halton Agricultural Society, should be well satisfied with the dairy show at Milton on September 24th.

Over the past four or five years, one of the most interesting features of Halton's Class B Fair at Milton, has been the special Junior Farmer Section. Thanks to the leadership given by the directorate of the Halton Agricultural Society, this section is now housed in a new building. Entries received would indicate that a total of 37 different 4H and Junior Farmer Groups will be represented by displays in the six different classes.
