Class 4 — Inter-Secondary School Competition: 1 Ross Austin, North Halton High School Area; 2 Tom Hunter, North Halton High School Area; 3 Bill Speck, Oakville-Trafalgar High School Area; 4 Glenn Irwin, Oakville-Trafalgar High School Area.

At the International Plowing Match to be held at Leamington, on October 12th to 14th, Halton's inter-county team will be composed of John Cunningham and Arnold Howden in the inter-secondary school competition at the same event the North Halton team of Ross Austin and Tom Hunter, and the Oakville-Trafalgar team of Bill Speck and Glenn Irwin, are eligible to compete. The final decision in both cases will rest with the members of the respective High School Area Boards.

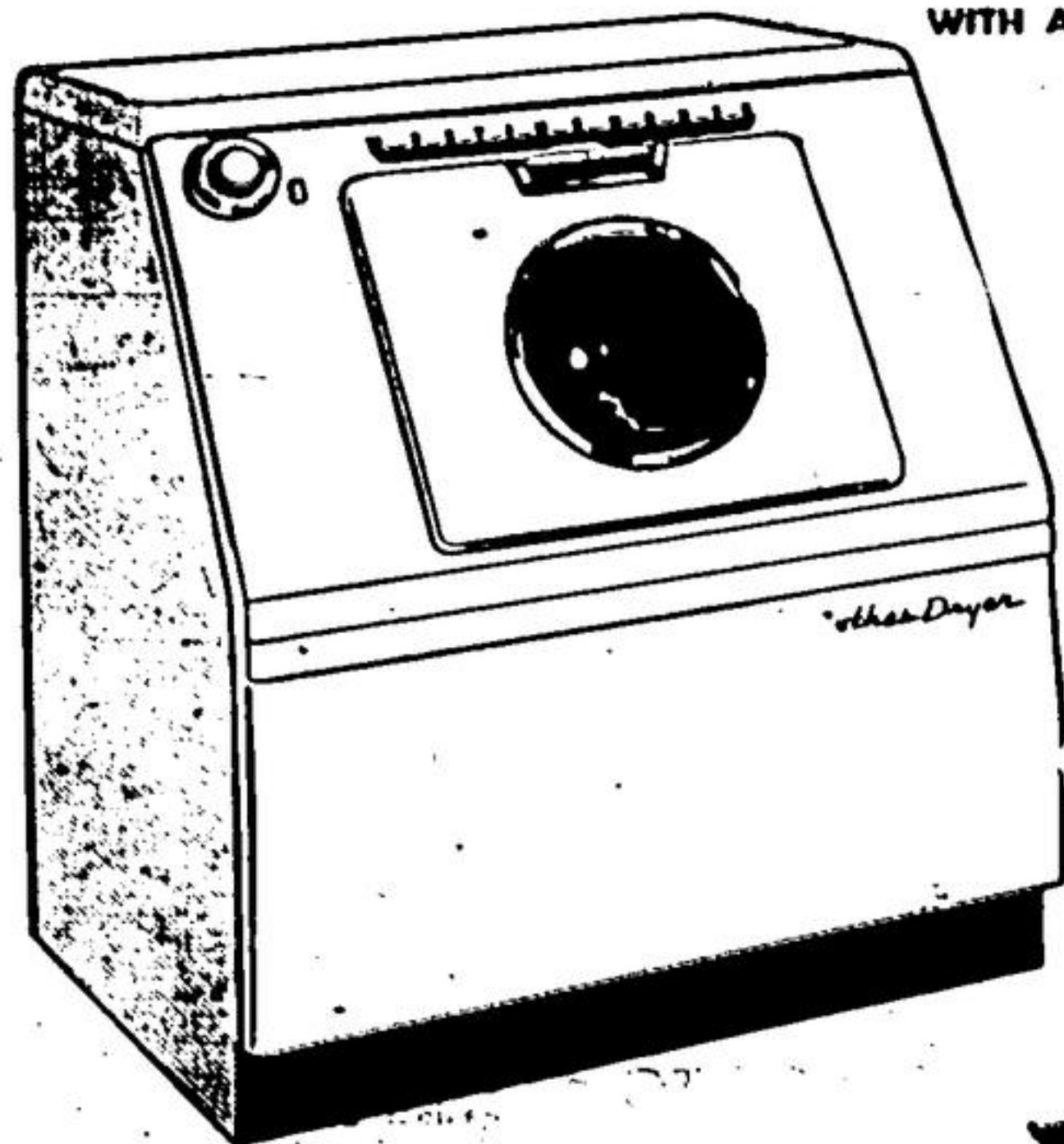

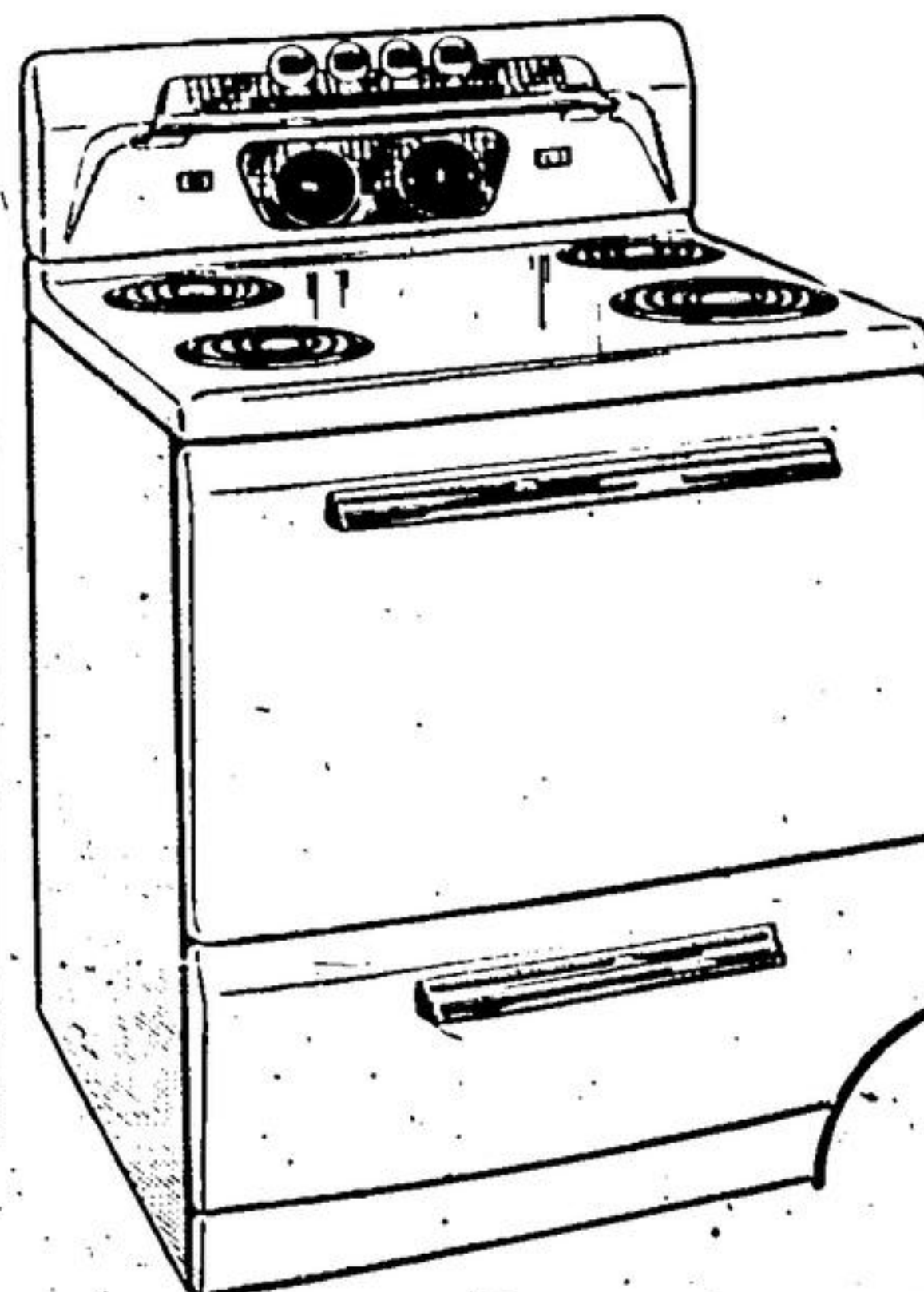
