#### Milton Firemen Hold Fire Prevention Clinic

The week of October 10th will be fire prevention week throughout Ontario. Recently we learned from Milton's fire chief, A. E. Clement, that to date this year, the Milton brigade has been called to 29 rural fires in this area. Fires are costly in many ways, and certainly anything that can be done to eliminate fire hazards is all to the good.

With this thought in mind, the Milton Fire Brigade is sponsoring a series of meetings in the area, during the week of October 3rd. According to present plans all meetings will be held in the evening, commencing at 8 p.m., and at the following centres:

#### IGA By-law Fine Stands Appeal Court Decides

Appeal of Bob Caldwell and Bruce Williamson, owners of the Georgetown IGA Store against a fine for infringing the town's store closing by-law was turned down Wednesday by the court of appeal of the Supreme Court of Ontario.

Because one member of the 3-man court refrained from expressing an opinion, the appellants have recourse to a higher court of law, the Supreme Court of Canada, if they wish to continue the case.

The case has been going on since February when the IGA Store first decided to contest a by-law which obliges stores to close Thursday afternoons.

For several weeks, IGA kept open all day Thursday and closed Mondays, and a charge was laid by Ontario Provincial Police, who were then in charge of law enforcement here, under a 1943 by-law.

The case was argued before Magistrate G. S. Hollingrake in court at Newmarket, who levied a fine of \$25 against each of the partners.

Appealed in county court on April 15th, Judge G. W. Morley upheld the decision and dismissed the appeal. C. E. Shand, of Downey and Shand who represented the appellants, based his case mainly on the fact that the original petition of merchants for closing regulations has been lost and cannot be produced by the town as evidence. The appeal on a point of law was whether IGA could lawfully be convicted without evidence that a proper petition was presented and that a sufficient number of authorized merchants had signed it.

John Ord of the local firm of Hewson and Ord, argued Wednesday that council must satisfy itself of the sufficiency of the petition and that once this was done it was obligatory for council to pass the by-law.

Majority decision of the appeal court was that it is a mandatory by-law and there is no onus on the municipality to prove the petition sufficient at this date, the assumption being that the 1953 council acted in good faith and had so assured themselves. The onus of proof, the court said, was for IGA to prove the petition was not sufficient.

Mr. Justice Daldry and J. K. Mackay shared the majority opinion of the appeal court, while J. S. Mackay was the member who refrained from

#### Boys and Girls Equal Peel Hospital Births

For the fourth month in the past eight months over one hundred babies were born in Peel Memorial Hospital at Brampton. The number of newborns in August was 108, which brought the total to date this year to 783, a slight increase over the same eight month period last year.

Prior to the August returns, the girls were leading the boys by a substantial margin, but during last month the males, with a recorded total of 62 as opposed to the females 43, evened the count and went one up. Of the 783 births at Peel Memorial so far this year, 302 were boys and 301 were girls.

It's a unique "stork derby" and with four more laps to go it will be interesting to watch developments. During the eight months, there were eight sets of twins born, three sets were boys, two sets were girls, and the other three sets were boy and girl twins.
