WHAT COUNCIL DID

Need Four Classrooms High School Next Fall

Need for another four classrooms next year at Georgetown High School, and ultimate need for another site for a larger building, was mentioned on Monday at the council meeting.

Mayor Armstrong said council's administrative committee had met recently with local high school board members and the school principal, and consensus of opinion seems to be that it is time North Halton school district is split into three.

The council has already petitioned county council to set up a consultative committee to investigate this possibility.

Reeve Stan Allen said John Bell, a former high school board chairman, has consented to act for the town on such a committee, and his name will be suggested to county council by the Georgetown members.

Romann Bros Construction were given permission to erect a 13 suite apartment house at the Edward St. - Prince Charles corner.

Cr. Sargent said he had talked to neighbouring residents, and had found no objection to such a building from them.

Delrex Developments asked a building-by-law amendment which would require a 75 foot setback on buildings along No. 7 highway in the subdivision. Fifty feet would be green belt and 25 feet parking area.

As Delrex owns the large bulk of land which would be so regulated, council agreed that the proposition would be sound.

Opinion was expressed that it was refreshing to find a subdivision asking to leave some open space, when so many requests have been made to okay projects which have encroached on the by-law in the opposite direction.

'Major' William Sawyers Veteran of First War

Familiarly known in town as "The Major," William Sawyers, 80, died in Sunnybrook Hospital on September 17th, and was buried in Pine Hill Cemetery last Tuesday.

Mr. Sawyers had been away from town for the past five years, living at the Soldiers Home at Sunnybrook.

Born in Hillsburgh, he was the son of James and Abigail Hammond Sawyers. He was living in Fort William at the outbreak of the first war and enlisted in the 95th Battalion and served overseas.

He lived in Georgetown after the war and in Toronto, where he worked at the Peabody Shirt factory. After retirement, he returned to town and lived with his sister, Mrs. Mary Cole, and later made his home for several years at the McGibbon House.

He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Mary Cole who lives at 9 Emery St. in town and Mrs. Murdock McCaulay of Port Dover.
