Baptists Mark 108th
Church Anniversary

The 108th anniversary services were observed at First Baptist Church on Sunday, with Dr. T. B. McDormand, Toronto, who is the General Secretary of the Baptist convention of Ontario and Quebec as guest preacher and Mrs. Marion Crowley Newby, Toronto, as soloist. The services of worship were conducted by Rev. A. J. Barker.

Dr. McDormand chose his text for the morning sermon from Acts 1:1: "The former treatise have I made O Theophilus of all that Jesus began both to do and teach." In Jesus' ministry there is a process of a reformation that cannot be stopped because God is in it. What Jesus began to do and teach 2000 years ago is still primarily being practiced from generation to generation. Jesus came into the world to make God His Father, real unto men. People must live in a saving relationship of their Lord.

The choir under Mrs. W. Townsend's direction sang "The Awakening Chorus" and Mrs. Newby's solos were "God Leads Us Along" and "Great is thy faithfulness."

In the evening Dr. McDormand's sermon title was "Lord, I want to be a Christian" relating his message in three points: 1. Whoever believeth that Jesus is the Christ is born of God, 2. If we believe we must love our fellow men, 3. When we love God we must obey his Commandments. Life was made to conform to the light of Jesus Christ and love is the dominant thing about our behaviour and not to be conformed of this world but to be transformed.

Mrs. Newby chose as her selections for the evening service: Mozart's arrangement of "When I Survey That Wondrous Cross" and the Negro spiritual "Lord I Want to be a Christian." The choir anthem was "Consecration."

Dies While Visiting
In New Brunswick

A resident of Georgetown for two years, George Asa Robinson, 52, died suddenly at Hotel Dieu Hospital, in Perth, N.B., on September 14th following a brief illness. Mr. and Mrs. Robinson purchased the Jim Kennedy home, 22 Guelph Street, when they moved to town from the maritimes.

A few weeks ago he went to New Brunswick to attend the wedding of their daughter Thais. Confined to hospital after a slight attack of paralysis, he never recovered.

Mr. Robinson was born at Gordonsville, Carleton County, N.B., son of Howard and Martha Robinson. For twenty years he resided at Riley Brook where he successfully operated Barker Bros. store. Two years ago the family moved to Georgetown where he and Mrs. Robinson have been adherents of the Georgetown Baptist Church.

Mr. Robinson is survived by his wife, the former Juanita Lockhart (one son Howard at Georgetown, five daughters, Mrs. Edmund Keyes (Zella) Pelham, Mass., Mrs. George Connors (Thais) Fredericton, N.B., Mrs. Joseph Kielbasa (Yvonne) Amherst, Mass., Landa and Marcia at home. Two brothers, Lawrence at Stickney and Arnold, Bath, N.B. Two sisters, Mrs. Vernon Rideout, Stickney, N.B., and Mrs. Jack Anderson Plaster Rock, B.C.

The funeral was held from the home of his sister, Mrs. Vernon Rideout, Stickney, to the Primitive Baptist Church. Service was conducted by Rev. A. Hatfield, assisted by Licentiate Philip Giberson and Rev. Arthur Clark. Hymns were the Golden Morning, Zion's Hill, solo by undertaker Britton, Some Golden Daybreak.

Burial was at St. John's Church. Pallbearers were Garfield and Neil Ross, Austin Howard, James Miller, James Hayden, and Lewis McSkill. Interment was in the Hunter Cemetery, Stickney, N.B.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

HIGHWAY RESURFACING GETS FINAL APPROVAL

While too late in the season to complete resurfacing of No. 7 Highway through town, in the opinion of town engineer Douglas Wilson, the long-delayed project is at last under way.

With approval through from the highway department, council Sept. 19 gave third reading to a by-law calling for the work.

It is planned to proceed immediately with storm sewers, and to save time invitation bids are being asked from half a dozen firms who presented their tenders to council last Monday.

Open bids are being advertised for curbs and sidewalks, and for grading and fill, these to be in council's hands by next Monday.

"As much of the work as is practical will be done this fall and the town is definitely assured of a smart new highway surface before next summer.

A new transit, necessary for the work of the engineering department will be purchased. The instrument, which costs \$500, will be purchased with a \$350 rebate from North Halton urban board, representing Georgetown's share of equipment purchased when the three towns shared services of one engineer, and the sale of the present transit.

Residents of Main St. S. below Maple Ave. will have street lighting service when a new light is installed in this area.

Permission was given the post office to place a stamp vending machine in front of the municipal building.

A stop sign was suggested on the extension of Charles Street where it enters a dangerous intersection at the Church Street corner.

Complaints of dust on several unpaved streets in town were turned over to the engineer for disposal.
