### **Junior Farmers Section** Milton Fair Stand-out

1955 marked the fifth anniversary of the inauguration of the Special Junior Farmer Section at Milton Fair Always a feature, this year's effort was generally considered to be not only the largest but the best all round display to date The Junior Farmers under the leadership of president John W. Picket, the 4H club members, and their leaders may well be proud of the result of their efforts Mrs Agnes King home economist for Wentworth, Waterloo, and Brant counties and Prof O Kennedy of the Ammal Husbandry Dept at the Ont. Agricultural College, were the official judges and both not only spoke highly of the displays generally but intimated that the Halton Junior Farmer Section was by far the best they had seen this year. As a matter of fact, judging by comments which have come to our ears from those who get around the province, the Halton Junfor Section is just about the best to be seen anywhere in Ontario.

The Dominion Stores Special for the best educational display of the 34 exhibits was awarded to that of the Milton Junior Institute. The theme here was what the Junior Homemaker should wear on various occasions. The reserve, according to Professor Kennedy, was won by the Halton 4-11 Grain Club display.
