Member of a prominent Union district farm family, and a former resident of Terra Cottan, Mrs. Robert C. Gibson was buried in Hamilton Cemetery on Thursday. Several relatives from town and district attended the funeral service in the city which she had lived for forty years.

Mrs. Gibson was the former Emily McKane daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James McKane. She was born at Linwood, and was a child when her parents moved to a farm at Union. After her marriage, she lived in Terra Cottan where her husband had a blacksmith shop which later was operated by W. G. Marshall of town. Forty years ago they moved to Hamilton where Mr. Gibson was a housing contractor. He has been dead for several years.

She was a member of Riverson United Church, where she took an active interest in the work of the missionary society.

She leaves two daughters, Alma who teaches school in Hamilton and Viola, Mrs. Lloyd Williamson, also a resident of Hamilton, two granddaughters, Beverly and Mary Jean Williamson, a brother James A. McKane, Georgetown, and two sisters, Mrs. Hugh Clark, Georgetown and Mrs. George Fraser, Hamiota, Manitoba. She was predeceased by four sisters.

TWO OTHER GROUPS

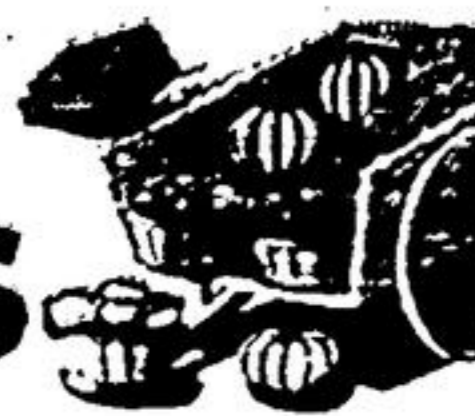
