School Enrolment Doubles Fifteen Years in Halton
 The opening meeting of the Halton Principals' Association was held at Glenwood School, Nelson township, on September 20th under the chairmanship of R. M. Acheson, principal of Glenwood.

L. L. Skuce, inspector, introduced four new principals, John Graham, Trafalgar, Clifford Grant, Trafalgar, Kennedy Skuce, Nelson, and Jack Leadbeater, Burlington. Mr. Skuce remarked on the rapid growth and expansion of the county. In 1920, 3400 pupils were taught by 116 teachers, now 10,000 pupils by 328 classroom teachers. Principals this year number 24, an increase of two over last year.

Six principals who had attended the O.P.S.M.T.F. Principals' Course in Administration and Supervision at McMaster last August, J. Leadbeater, Burlington; N. H. Stevenson, Burlington; W. K. Armstrong, Trafalgar; D. R. Kemp, Nelson; W. Siddall, Milton, under the chairmanship of R. A. Hopkins, of Bronte, gave a panel report of the course using quotations from the prominent educators who had addressed the course.

All leading educators stress the increased importance of the role of the principal in modern education. The modern principal is recognized as the key figure in education of a school and he is expected to be administrator, supervisor and plant manager. Education today is one of the "big businesses" both in dollars and importance. Principals are being released from classroom duties more and more to handle these other important functions.

R. H. Bornhold, inspector, who has just returned from the Auxiliary Branch in the Dept. of Education gave a brief outline of this specialized department for a typical pupil.
