I PROMISED LAST WEEK I'd tell you about the "legend" surrounding the picturesque limestone gorge and caverns on Joe Prucyk's Waterfalls Playground property. So I got in touch with Mr. K. C. Lindsay, who is descended from one of the ploneer families in the district. Mr. Lindsay told me a story which seems to prove once again that truth can be stranger than fiction. Because it is no legend, but a true story concerning what went on there some 80 years ago . . .

IN THOSE DAYS, the property was owned and used as their headquarters, by the "Jones gang," a notorious group of horse thieves The father and his several sons conducted their nefarious activities with a grist mill as their "front," They had a large pond covering seven or eight acres, and a dam, beside which they built their mill. The mill was located just below where the

Beeney house stands today. had imagined they used the gorge and caverus to hide their stolen horses in, but they had a much better idea than that They built a waterproof stable under the pond, with the entrance door just under the tail race of the full. In case you are wondering, as I did, what the tail race is - it is where the water runs away after it goes over the water wheel. When anyone approached the property, the gang opened the dam enough to let a good I.H of water go over the wheel

In this way they completely concealed the door of the underground stable. Some of the roof timbers are still visible where Mr Prucyk has rebuilt the dam. The original dam has been gone for over sixty years now, and the stable long since caved in

THE JONES GANG were known and feared all over the province. They were no small time operators. When they took the stolen horses to their concealed stable, they kept them there until they had changed their appearance by clipping and dyeing, and then took them to the Niagara district, as a rule, to sell. And the amazing thing is that

thye were never caught or prosecuted. Their neighbours were aware of what was going on, but as Mr Lindsay succintly put it, they all had buildings that would burn

After a number of years, the gang broke up, no one really knew why. The supposition was that things were getting a bit too hot for them. and they had started disagreeing among themselves. A couple of them bought property in this district however. One bought a farm near Limehouse, and another owned a "clubhouse," right next to where the present Stewart town hall is located. The building was moved or demolished, I'm not quite sure which, to make room for the parking lot next to the township half . . .

I WONDERED IF the Jones reformed after the gang broke up, but Mr Lindsay said no, that he wouldn't exactly call them model citizens .

Mr. Lindsay's father, the late James R. Lindsay remembered the Jones Gang quite well, and so does Dr. H. A. McCullough. Mr. Lindsay's grandfather owned the property just below that belonging to the Jones gang, where the Grants and Glynns now have their homes. In fact, when the Jones first arrived here from Wales, it is believed, the late Mr. Lindsay sold them four acres of his prop-
