WHAT COUNCIL DID

Four New Poll Booths For Over 2700 Voters

Over 2700 men and women are eligible to vote in the December municipal elections this year, according to Mayor Jack Armstrong who reviewed voting arrangements at last night's council meeting.

There will be 8 polling subdivisions this year, doubling those of former years.

Wards 2 and 3 have been split into three subdivisions each and Ward 1 will have two.

There are 714 voters in Ward 1. Those who live south of the CNR tracks will vote at the fire hall, while those in the northern part of the ward will have a more convenient location to be chosen later.

Ward 2, largest with 1063 voters, will have last year's two subdivisions increased to three. The College View district will use Cyril Engleby's house as a voting place. South of the CNR tracks and north of King Street and Queen Street will vote at the Thomas Grieve home. The rest of the ward, which stretches west to the highway will form the new subdivision.

There are 830 voters in Ward 3, which will also have three polling booths. The district east of Main and north of Maple will vote at the Municipal building. The park district, west of Main will vote at the public library. Third section of the ward, comprising the Normandy, Sunbeam and Delrex areas will vote at a location to be decided.

Hiring of Tom Schenk as a member of the town works staff was confirmed by council.

Tenders were advertised for installing sewers in the Hewson subdivision and from Delrex to the sewage disposal. Council will amend the building by-law plan.

Law to allow buildings on a corner lot to be 25 feet from one boundary and 10 feet from the other. Up to the present there has been some confusion, over a clause which states that if a house fronts on the flankage side it can be 10 feet from the street boundary, but otherwise it must be 25 feet.

Mayor Armstrong read a letter which was composed by the administration committee to be sent to a discharged town employee who had requested an explanation. The committee met with the town foreman and engineer and explained in the letter the reasons for his discharge.

Robbery Charge for Men Apprehended After Chase

Two Toronto men were apprehended by combined action of a merchant, a garage man and local police when they attempted to steal a mantle radio from the Wigo Television Store Saturday afternoon.

Store proprietor Morris Goudekting served the men when the purchased a piece of wire which they said was to fix an electric range. After they left the store, he noticed the radio missing, and ran after them, stopping them across the street in front of Livingstone's Bakery.

One man had a radio under his coat and Mr. Goudekting obtained this back before the men started to run up Main Street hill. Fred Maveal, who noticed the commotion from his garage, jumped into a truck and gave chase, catching one man at the top of the hill. Meanwhile, Constable Jim Bilborough, who had been notified of the robbery, proceeded up Cross St. and caught the other man on the highway.

The men, who are brothers, were lodged in Milton jail and will be charged in court next Wednesday with theft.

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The Ontario Municipal Board gave notice of a public hearing which will be held in town later this month, to decide on council's request to issue debentures for a \$42,800 addition to the municipal building.

Final reading was given to a borrowing-by-law for \$32,000 for the 2-room addition to Wigglesworth School. Initial readings were given to a \$63,000 debenture by-law to pay for a variety of civic services including the landfill machine, sidewalks, pavement, sewers and water.

Council Approves Union Gas Franchise

Third, such company to request a natural gas distribution franchise in Georgetown, Union Gas was given initial approval with two readings of a by-law similar to those already read for Halton Natural Gas and Anthony Gas and Oil.

Lawyer John Evans and company manager T. P. Pinckard, who had visited council last week, returned again last night to present the by-law.

Mayor Armstrong objected to the word "produce" in the by-law and after lengthy discussion, this was qualified by adding a clause interpreting the meaning as adding propane gas to the lines in case of an emergency shortage, rather than any thought of the company manufacturing gas in town.

During the discussion it was learned that the Ontario Fuel Board might interpret a ratepayers' vote this year as asking for opinion on which company people want to serve them.

Mayor Armstrong said the vote, in his opinion, should be on whether Georgetown people want natural gas, and that decision on which companies will be granted franchises would be made later by the council. The fuel board will be contacted about this.

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Ontario champions for the second time in three years, Georgetown N&Gs finished their season in a blaze of glory Wednesday, defeating Huntsville here in the sixth game of their series. Georgetown won 4 games to 2.

The N&Gs are intermediate B provincial champions as a result of their win.

The game, like all others with the northerners, was close and exciting. Huntsville retained a lead most way through the game until the 4th period Georgetown pulled out all the stops and banged in four goals for a final score of 8-6.

Joe Caruso, who scored Georgetown's last goal had an exceptionally good night. He got the first 3 local goals, one in the 1st and two in the second. G. Evans and Bennett each scored and Hillson tallied two.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Prince Charles Resident Objects to Apartment

Strong objections from Roy Warwick, a Prince Charles Drive resident were made to council last night to a proposed apartment building on the street which would be erected by Romanin Bros.

Mr. Warwick carried a copy of the Sept. 28th Herald which quoted Cr. Doug Sargent as saying that he had checked with residents and found no objections to an apartment in what has been a restricted single-dwelling subdivision.

"I for one strongly object and so do other neighbours I have talked to," said Mr. Warwick, asking council to reconsider the permission given to the contracting firm.

Checking with building inspector Douglas Wilson, and finding that no permit has yet been issued for the apartment, Cr. McGillivray suggested that it be delayed.

Cr. Sargent said he had apparently not checked far enough and that he had no intention of granting something which would not find favour with people who had purchased homes in the subdivision.

Mayor Armstrong said there is a legal point whether Romanin Brothers could be stopped from building an apartment, even though the company had so agreed, when there are no zoning provisions in the town's building by-law. The planning committee was delegated to take the matter up with the town solicitor, and the building inspector was instructed to withhold issuing a permit in the meantime.

The Poppy Fund committee was given permission to hold a tag day on Saturday, November 5th.

Town engineer Douglas Wilson was granted a \$25 monthly car allowance.

Armstrong's Garage was given permission to remove four trees on town property in front of the highway property which the firm has purchased from Thomas Warnes.

A garage on the property of Sam Harrison, which was made unusable by the opening of Henry Street will be moved at town expense to face on Henry.

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
