## Feature Events at the Georgetown Fall Fair

There were a number of features at Georgetown Fair this year, and one was a fine exhibit in the exhibit hall. Quite a number of new exhibitors were welcomed along with the older exhibitors, and their efforts along with those of the school children helped present one of the finest hall displays on record. Many fine comments came to the ears of the directors, and one was from Mrs. George Stanger, whose husband is owner of the four or five rides which played the show this year. Mrs. Stanger covers many of the fairs in Ontario and Western Canada, and her opinion of the fine hall arrangements was that it is one of the best in the business.
