Clifford Waite Named To McMaster Senate
At a meeting of the Senate of McMaster University, Clifford Waite, student minister at Lowville, was named to the executive committee of the Senate.
Plans were completed for the installation of the Hon. Mr. Justice R. L.

Kellock to be installed as Chancellor of the University on October 21 and for the conferring of an honorary Doctor of Laws on Mayor Lloyd D. Jackson in the afternoon. At the evening convocation the Right Hon. Louis St. Laurent, Prime Minister of Canada, will give the main convocation address and receive an honorary Doctor of Laws.

Mrs. H. A. Dolson, 89 Chinguacousy Pioneer

Mrs. H. Aikin Dolson, 89 who died in Georgetown last Wednesday was one of the oldest residents of this part of Ontario.
She was born in Chinguacousy Township and lived all her life there until moving to Georgetown three years ago.
The former Annie Isabella Cation, her parents were Mr. and Mrs. William Cation. Following her marriage to Mr. Dolson, who died seven years ago, they settled on the Dolson home-stand five miles away at Lot 17, 4th Line West. Their son Harold was the third generation farmer on this crown deed land when he sold out to Mr. Beardmore three years ago and moved to Georgetown.
Mrs. Dolson was active in ladies organizations in the now-closed Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church, and later attended the Presbyterian Church in Norval. She was a life member of the Woman's Missionary Society. She belonged to the Eastern Star and many years ago was a lady director on the Hampton fair board.
She leaves two children, Harold of Georgetown and May, Mrs. Lorne Cleave of Norval, and two grandsons, Jim and Barry Cleave. One of a family of six, she was predeceased by five brothers.
Rev. Alex Calder conducted the funeral service on Friday at the Harold C. McClure funeral home with interment following in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval. Pallbearers were Clarence and Alex Dolson, W. L. McClure, Gordon, Hunter and Lew Cation.

The Apple Day was organized under the direction of Scoutmaster Fred Cooley, assisted by the following members of the group committee - Don Murray, Keith Webb and Rev. James Maxwell. It was with regret that members of the committee learned that the chairman, Mr. Eddie Burke was ill in Peel Memorial Hospital, and therefore unable to be present.
During the morning, cocoa and coffee were served the canvassers from St. Paul's rectory by Mrs. G. Shering, Mrs. Cooley and Mrs. Maxwell.

Timbers, Ferguson Esso International Plowmen

Bib Timbers, Stouffville and Jerry Ferguson, Croton, are Canadian plowing champs, following their win last Thursday at Leamington. Third place winner Mickey Denman, Portage la Prairie, will accompany Timbers on the overseas trip next year.
Fourteen plowmen representing seven provinces - four more than were represented last year - are expected to vie for Canada's top plowing championship when the Esso Silver Plow goes "on the block" October 13.
The Canadian championship will take place on the third day of the four-day 42nd Annual International Plowing Match, October 11 to 14. The International, sponsored by the Ontario Plowmen's Association will be held on some 1200 acres on and around the farm of John Rahm of Blytheswood, near Leamington.
The two western provinces to be represented have already selected their plowmen. British Columbia's choices are Sven Swanson and Tom Hickman, both of Chilliwack, Manitoba's entries will be Jim Bonnar of Roland and Ed Demman of Portage la Prairie.
Five other provinces, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island will be entering two contestants apiece. Their entrants were decided by the outcome of regional matches.
In addition to winning the Silver Plow trophy, the Canadian champion will become a member of a two-man team to represent Canada in the 4th annual world plowing match in England in October, 1956. With him will go another high scorer from the Canadian match. Under a new ruling by the newly organized Canadian Council of Plowing Associations, not more than one man from any one province can represent Canada in the world match. If both the winner and runner up are from the same province, the Canadian overseas team will consist of the winner and the man who finishes third in the Canadian championship match. The overseas trip will be provided by Imperial Oil Ltd. for the two plowmen and a team manager, to be appointed by the CCPA.
Of special interest to Ontarians will be two other Imperial-sponsored contests, known as the Esso classes - one for horse plowmen and one for tractor plowmen - which are open only to contestants from Ontario. Winners will receive gold medals and a trip to another part of Canada next year to take part in some match outside the province. Runners-up will receive silver medals.
Hon. F. S. Thomas, Ontario minister of agriculture, will open the Blytheswood match, which plowing officials predict will be at least as big as last year's. Accommodations for 150,000 spectators will be provided. Plowing officials estimate their-tr-
