Toronto Minister United Anniversary Speaker

On Sunday, October 30th St. John's United Church will celebrate their 116th anniversary According to available information the area of Georgetown was being served by, ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church as far back as 1836. The Wesleyan Methodist church was opened in the fall of 1841. For some years the two Mrthodist churches carried on in Georgetown until in 1883 the two Wesleyan Methodist Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church united to form the Methodist Church of Canada. The two congregations became 1 and services were held in the former Methodist Episcopal structure

In the year 1910 the Congregational Church in Georgetown (the present library building) was closed and some of its members united with the Methodist Church

In the year 1925 a union of great significance to the life of the church in Canada took place when two thirds of the Presbyterian Church of Canada. the Congregational Church of Canada. and the Methodist Church of Canada voted to unite to form the United Church of Canada With this union a large number of the members of the Presbyterian Church who favoured union united with the members of the Methodist Church to form the local congregation of The United Church of Canada.

To celebrate the occasion of the 116th anniversary special services of thanksgiving and worship will be held. The anniversary speaker will be Rev. W J Johnston, DD, for many years minister of Eglinton United Church in Toronto. Special music is being prepared by the choir. Mr. Leslie Gillespie, baritone soloist will be singing at both services. On Tuesday evening the congregation will hold family night for the congregation with supper at 6.30 and a fine programme afterwards.
