District Governor at Lions Club Meeting

The Lions Club of Georgetown will welcome at its regular meeting on November 1st at 7 p.m., District Governor Claude Miller, governor of District A-2, Lions International, which included 50 clubs in this section of Ontario. Lion Miller is a member of the Lions Club of Dunnville, is a past president of that club, a key member of Lions International, and has a record of fourteen years of 100 per cent



attendance at club meetings. He is a graduate of Queen's University, is vice principal of the Dunnville High School and a Steward of Grace United Church Dunnville.

Lion Miller is one of the 24 district governors who supervise the activities of the 11,752 Lions Clubs, Lions International was formally founded in 1917 in Dallas, Texas and during the past 38 years has become the largest, most active, and fastest growing service club organization in the world. There were on August 31 Lions Clubs in 70 countries or geographical locations of the world with a membership of 519,440. During the fiscal year of 1954-55, 887 new Lions Clubs were organized, of which five were in district A-2.

The Lions Clubs' special mission is the promotion of good government and good citizenship and development of civic, educational, social and moral welfare of the community and nation, and to help create and foster a spirit of generous consideration among the peoples of the world. 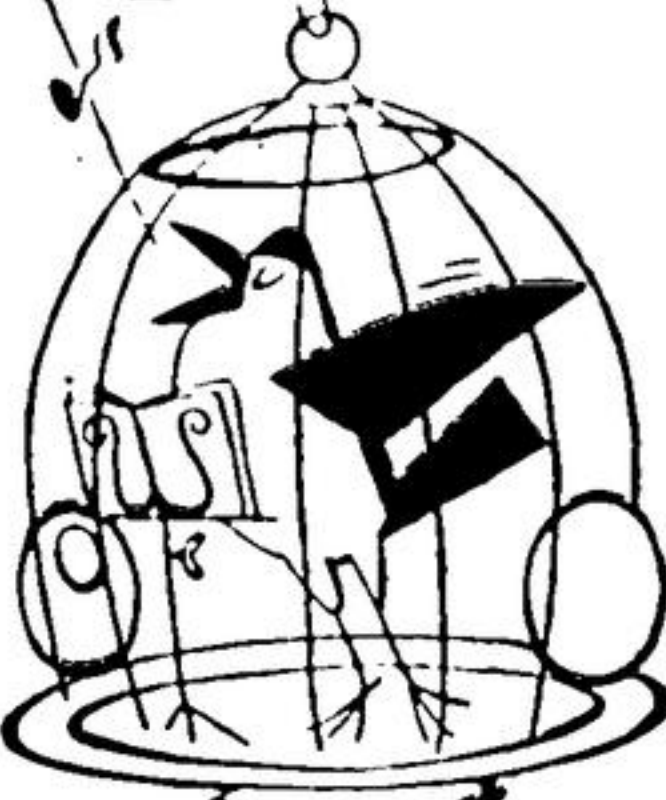
