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Prominent in Community, Church Work, Mrs. J. B. Mackenzie Dies

Prominent in civic and church organizations for many years, Mrs. J. B. Mackenzie, 77, died at her home, 36 Mill Street last Wednesday after an illness of several months' duration.

Mrs. Mackenzie is particularly remembered for her work during the depression days of the "30s" when she headed a Georgetown relief committee and conducted many private charities for local people who felt the effect of the countrywide recession in employment.

Formerly Eliza Head McQueen, she was the daughter of John McQueen and his wife Martha Head who farmed north of Rockwood in Yramosa Township. Both her mother and father were members of pioneer district families.

She attended public school in Rockwood and high school in Georgetown, then took teachers' training at Milton Model School and Toronto-Normal. Before her marriage she taught school in Moaboro and in Acton.

Mr. J. B. Mackenzie lived in Acton when they were first married and forty years ago became Georgetown residents when he built the large home on Mill Street in which the family still resides. Mr. Mackenzie, an Acton and Georgetown contractor and coal and lumber merchant, was once mayor of the town.

Mrs. Mackenzie was one of the stalwart members of the Local Council of Women and had served that organization in every office including terms as president. She was active in the affairs of Georgetown Horticultural Society when that organization existed, and also belonged to a reading club which was popular a few years ago. She was a prominent member of Knox Presbyterian Church where she once taught Sunday School. She belonged to Main Circle of the Women's Association and was a life member of the Woman's Missionary Society.

Mr. Mackenzie died in 1947 and their younger son in 1950. Surviving are one son Sam and daughters Jean and Margery of Georgetown; five grandchildren, Marna, Sandy and David of Georgetown, Jack and Margaret of Acton. Eldest of her family, her death made the first break in a family circle and she also leaves three sisters and two brothers, Mrs. William Pasmore, Rockwood; Miss Tina McQueen and Mrs. Jean McRae, Lacombe, Alta; Alex McQueen, Regina, Sask.; and James McQueen, Edmonton, Alberta.

Rev. Alex Calder conducted the funeral service in Knox Church on Saturday. Pallbearers were James P. Evans, Campbell Sinclair and four nephews, Ed and Win Pasmore, Rock-

wood, Robert Borthwick and Gilbert Lovelock, Guelph. Managers and elders of the church were among those who acted as flower bearers. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

FRANK MEZWICK, 74 NATIVE OF POLAND

A farmer and quarry worker in Terra Cotta district since 1920, Frank Mezwick, 74, was buried in Gies Williams Cemetery on Friday following funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home in town. Mr. Mezwick had been seriously ill for some time and died at his home in Terra Cotta on Wednesday.
