The chairman, C. V. Charters, informed the Board of the bequest of \$1,000 from the late Miss Margaret Wash, of Toronto. Mr. D. W. Duggan, chairman of the finance committee, announced receipt of a cheque for \$500 from Miss Eva Aikins, also of Toronto. Both of these ladies were born in Brampton and resided there for many years. Miss Walsh is the daughter of the late Patrick Walsh, who was for many years owner of the Queen's Hotel and served for several terms on the town council. Miss Aikins is the daughter of the late Hon. John C. Aikins, former Liberal member of Parliament in Peel County and later a member of the Canadian Senate.

Another announcement of a recent bequest to Peel Memorial came in a letter from A. G. Davis, Q.C. advising the Board that in the will of the late Mrs. Rose Fenwick, of Brampton, the hospital was bequeathed the sum of \$5,000. A bequest of \$100 was also received earlier this year from the late Mrs. Leslie Ina Sanderson, of Brampton.

The philanthropy shown by these four ladies to the hospital is not only greatly beneficial in a financial way, but is most encouraging and reassuring to the Board as it indicates in a most tangible way that the work and services of this health institution are finding general favour and making a lasting impression on ex-Bramptonians as well as resident of the immediate area served by the Peel Memorial Hospital.
