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Remembrance Service Sunday

Sunday will be a solemn occasion in Georgetown when, after morning church services, citizens will gather at the cenotaph to remember young men who might have been with us today, save for two World Wars and a conflict in Korea.

The service is always impressive in its simplicity. It follows a set pattern, with local ministers taking part in a worship service, singing of hymns which lend themselves to the occasion, and the reading of names of those who died in conflict, followed by placing of wreaths by individuals and organizations around the cenotaph.

Forums Discuss Ways Ease Teacher Shortage

 The first broadcast of National Farm Radio Forum for the 1955-56 season was heard Monday evening, October 31st. The topic under discussion was the shortage of school teachers and what might be done by different groups to relieve this condition.

Some of the Halton group reporting suggested that parents should encourage and try to influence members of the family to be school teachers. The majority of forums mentioned ways of making life more pleasant

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for teachers, thus encouraging them to continue in the profession. All groups felt close cooperation between parents, school boards, municipal bodies and teachers would be a great help. Parents should teach discipline and respect at home. The school board should provide attractive working and living surroundings. Practically all groups suggested financial aid in the form of scholarships to suitable students might be offered by the provincial government, and the federal government might standardize education for all provinces.

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
