The proprietor of Credit Valley Bottling Works had the money in a bedroom, \$200 in two pouches which his sons had gathered in their week-end deliveries to customers, and \$400 in a box.

The theft occurred sometime between 7.40 p.m. and 8.15 p.m., the only time the house was unoccupied that day.
