FARM NEWS .

HIGH YIELD IN GRAIN CORN COMPETITION

The results of the Grain Crop competition, sponsored by Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association, were just received. When the competition was organized last spring, sixteen Halton growers made entry. The competition called for a minimum of three acres and no restrictions weer placed on variety, cultural practices, etc. The last week in-October, two rods of one row, at each of four points in each field were picked and weighed. Ten average ears from each competitor's field were then sent to Guelph to determine percentage molsture shelling percentage and finally, yield of shelled corn; per acre on a 15 per cent moisture basis. The top yields is 114

bushels per acre; in second place is 113.9 bushels; in third 104.9. The average yield of the group was approximately 85 bushels per acre. The moisture content varied all the way from 23.8 per cent to 40.2 per cent. The winner will receive the Gold Watch donated by the Milton Milling Company. The presentation will be made at the annual meeting of the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association, in late December, at which time a complete report will be presented.
