We will have 200 new enemies after they read this column, but we can't help but agree with the present policy of enforcing speed laws in town limits.

Some two hundred people have been clocked over the speed limit, summonsed and fined. There will be others in future, the police department warns, for they are determined to make Georgetown's streuts safer and the most effective method is to reduce speeding in general by nabbing speeders in particular. .

Police chief Haley is quoted as saying that it is not his intention to persecute drivers. And while he doesn't say so, there is a good bit of leeway being
