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### Record Attendance at Remembrance Service

Last Sunday saw what is believed to be the biggest attendance since 1945 at the Cenotaph, to witness the Remembrance Day service. The parade also was a large one, overshadowing other years in attendance.

The new time, 12:30 seems to have proved a popular one, with people coming directly from their remembrance services at their respective churches.

After the parade arrived at the Cenotaph, an introduction was made by Mayor John T. Armstrong, who spoke feelingly of those who had paid the ultimate sacrifice for their fellow citizens. The Lorne Scots Band then played "O God Our Help in Ages Past" after which the Lord's Prayer was said in unison, led by Rev. A. Barker. The Holy Scripture, Rev. 21:17 was read by Rev. Morgan McFarlane. The placing of wreaths then took place by those who had been bereaved and by the various organizations. The Honour Roll was called, 1914-1918 by J. Fred McCartney, 1939-45 and Korean War by Leslie Clark. "O Valiant Hearts" was played by the Lorne Scots Band. The boys' band also played a selection beautifully. Rev. Kenneth Richardson, padre of Branch 120, Canadian Legion, made the address, making a strong plea for remembrance of those who had given their lives to be remembered by the living, and also said he hoped that sometime in the near future the country would adopt a national remembrance day, to be observed simultaneously at 11 o'clock throughout the country. Memorial Prayers were said by Rev. Alex Calder followed by the Last Post, two minutes' silence, and then Reveille. The service ended with the singing of God Save the Queen, followed by a benediction by Rev. Ken Richardson.

### Keith Nixor. Buried In Greenwood Cemetery

A hospital patient in Toronto for many years, after injuries suffered while serving overseas in the first war, Alfred Keith Nixor, 57, was buried in Greenwood Cemetery here this afternoon.

Son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Chris Nixor, he was a native of Stewarttown. His father was a harness maker and the family moved to Georgetown when he was a youth. He attended public and high school here, joined the army when he was 17.

His closest relative in this district is an aunt, Mrs. M. M. Ross, R. R. 2, who is his mother's sister. Interment this afternoon followed a funeral service in Toronto.

This pledged money may be left at either bank at any time, and a very important fact, in view of the \$40,000 still to be raised, the banks will extend credit on the strength of the signed pledges. ### Peel Hospital Sets New Record

Peel Memorial Hospital continued setting new records last month in several departments.

First in respect to the births registered in October. The total for the month this year shows a new high of 115 as compared to 84 for the same month a year ago. An increase for the month of 31 (one per day) or 27 per cent. It is also an increase of five over the previous month's total of 110.

The male infants again outdistanced the females as the record shows 63 boys and 52 girls came into being at Peel Memorial in the month just ended.

For the ten months of 1955, the total number of births at your local hospital is 1008 an increase of exactly 100 over the same period in 1954, when the total was 908.

The baby boys continued to forge ahead of the girls and with just two laps to go (November and December) the score sheet shows the boys in the lead by 32 heads, with 520 birth registrations compared to the girls total of 488.

The busiest day of the past month in the maternity ward was Friday, October 21st, when eight babies were ushered into the world — two girls and six boys — a record for any twenty-four hour period at the Peel Memorial.

Two sets of twins were recorded last month; twin girls to Mr. and Mrs. Roy King at Mono Road on October 24th and twin boys to Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Nelson of R. R. 1, Malton, on October 28th.

In addition to the record month in the maternity ward, other departments of the hospital also showed a marked increase in number of patients admitted as well as those served as "out-patients". Last year the combined total of patients in October was 500 — this year 614 — or an increase of 22 per cent.

This continuing increase of patients is taxing the hospital's facilities to the limit. As further proof of the overcrowding the following figures showing the number of patients which had to be admitted to corridors until a room could be found for them later is conclusive evidence that more rooms and ancillary services must be made available as soon as possible if the hospital is to provide the services now being demanded of it.

In the ten months January to October, 1954, the number of patients in corridor beds totalled 387. For the same period this year the total was 803 (over 80 per month) an increase of 236 or almost 30 per cent over last year.

In October alone 138 patients, 48 male and 90 female) had to be provided with corridor beds by a temporary measure.
