## Esqueuing Council Opposes Area School Board Consultative Committee

### W.I. WELCOMES TWO FORMER MEMBERS

Objection to setting up a consultative committee to investigate dissolution of North Halton high school district, was expressed at last week's meeting of Esqueuing Council.

The committee was set up on the urging of Georgetown and Milton, after Mayor Jack Armstrong, Georgetown and Reeve Carl Martin, Milton, had expressed their opinion publicly that reverting to three-separate school boards might be desirable.

The high school district, which operates schools in Georgetown, Milton and Acton has been in existence for seven years. Five municipalities comprise the district, the three towns plus townships of Esqueuing and Nasagaweya.

The district was formed by county council and can only be dissolved by that body. The consultative committee has the task of examining all aspects of the district and reporting its findings to the county council, which in turn will make a decision on whether the district shall stay as constituted, or be changed.

Text of the resolution passed at the Esqueuing meeting says: "That in the opinion of this council there is no necessity for the appointment of a consultative committee of county council regarding the North Halton high school district, that no useful purpose would be served by appointing such a committee. That this council is opposed to the setting up of such a committee, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the county council for their meeting on November 8th, 1955, with the request that they rescind the motion 'to appoint such a committee' which was passed at their last meeting."

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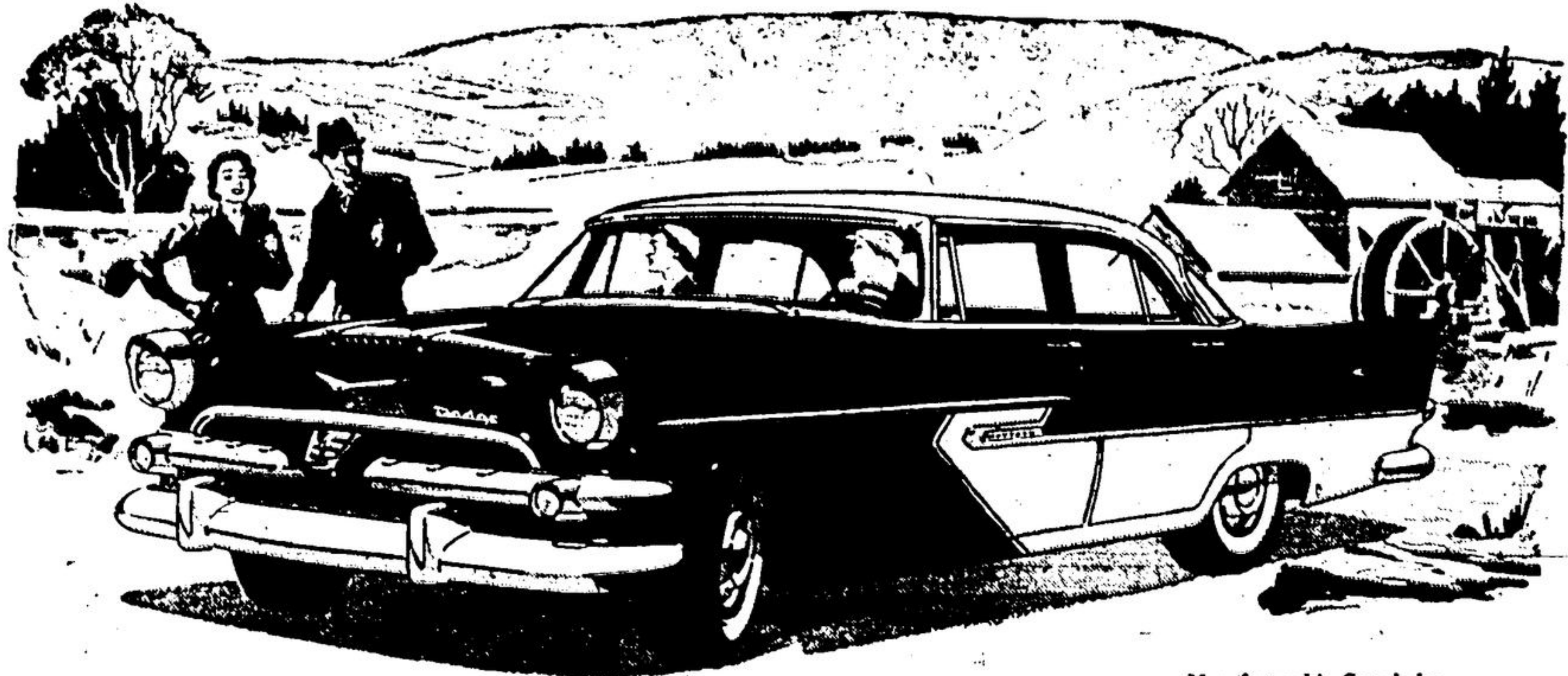
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
