Secretary Outlines Aims Of Farmers' Union

A meeting of Ballinafad farm union local was heldfin the community hall . ASHGROVE last Wednesday at which Wellington county secretary Lloyd Hasson was guest speaker.

Mr. Hasson gave a resume of achievements, progress and aims of the Ontario Parmers Union. He pointed out that in a three year period the union has grown from two to 100 locals. Recognition has grown in press, radio, government, agricultural bodies and labour unions, even as the "Agricultural Opposition Group."

The union, he said, had done a great deal to educate members in orderly producer-controlled unarketing. even to backing the Ontario hog producers, although not always credited with this because of a wedge of pre-Judice between our two farm organizations. A brief to this body of producers proved beneficial. A brief to grain commissioners and the dominion government also had its reward to all farmers buying western grain.

Labour groups have been met, resulting in better understanding between producer and consumer. Machinery dealers were met, proving this should have been done sooner. The interprovincial farm umon council's briefs to the agricultural committee at Ottawa proved they are still not aware of the union's position or they refuse to admit it.

The union movement spread out in British Columbia furthers the aim of a national organization from coast to coast, he said. The chief aim is still parity prices to maintain a decent standard of living for farmers, the forgotten 19 per cent of the population, who now receive little more than aix per cent of the national income.

The union, he continued, will continue to seek better provincial legislation for setting up producers controlled marketing schemes, so that a price tag can be placed on the farmer's labour. It is supporting erection of a northern university, and assisting Sudbury farmers in their plight against sulphur fume damage.

Steps have been take to put a monthly news bulletin in every member's home.

A discussion period followed the meeting.
