**Valley Authority Vetoes Huttonville Dam Project**

Meeting at Mono Centre on October 5th, members of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority decided to take no action on an estimated \$50,000 rebuilding project at the Huttonville dam.

Originally estimated to cost about \$15,000, members heard a report of the engineering firm of R. K. Kilboe and Associates which quoted the higher figure.

While members sympathized with the desires of Huttonville residents, who wish to retain their recreational facilities, opinion was that the dam is not a major factor in flood control for the watershed, and that costs should be paid by the community directly affected if any action is to be taken.

G. A. Hicks, Huttonville, said Huttonville people feel the dam can be replaced for \$15,000 and suggested tenders be called. The conservation board, however, decided to accept the engineer's advice. A Chinguacousy member, E. Blair was the only dissenting member when the vote was taken.

Chairman D. J. Heddington urged to press Queen's Park for early production of the full report on the survey made a year ago of the Credit Valley. He expressed a hope that some specific action could be taken in the northern part of the watershed where gravel pits are operating and where there is possibility of increased destruction through expanding operations which will come with the St. Lawrence Seaway.

Alex MacLaren, Georgetown, told of three farms where gully control plans will be tried — C. Thompson, Esquing, D. McDonald, Chinguacousy, and R. House, Toronto Township.

The authority will pay 50 per cent of expenses involved, providing the farmers agree to allowing the public to view the projects.

Reporting on public relations, W. M. Robinson, Brampton, told of distribution of blotters, pictures and copies of "Our Valley" to schools, and that movies and still pictures for future publicity are in progress.

Possibility of zoning Caledon Township to preserve the conservation area in the Belfountain - Credit Forks area, was discussed.

The Dept. of Planning and Development was asked to suggest a remedy for log jams on the river in Caledon Township which has been flooding neighbouring farms.
