We have a 9 man council, mayor, reeve, deputy and 6 councillors; a 2-man hydro commission; and a 6-man public school board. The complete council is elected yearly, as is one hydro commissioner for a 2-year term; and three school board members for 2year terms.

Presently on council are Mayor Jack Armstrong, Reeve Stan Allen, Deputy Reeve Allan Norton and Councillors Garfield McGilvray, Thos. L. Lyons, Doug tends to seek office. Sargent, Harry Hale, Walter Gray and Irwin Nobleyear to serve, while E. W. Binkley's term ends in December. On the school board Ray Salter, Cecil McNamara, and Stan Finlay serve one more year, while Ed Wilson, Harry Shortill and Bob Stewardson are completing their two years.

## Hunters Flock District For Four Day Deer Hunt

Hunters from many parts of the province are flocking into Halton today, joining resident hunters in the first open deer season in history.

It is four or five years since there has been any deer hunting here, and at that time licences were restricted in number with a large percentage reserved for residents. The hunt will be concentrated in Esquesing and Nassagaweya where deer are plenti-

Township residents have mixed feelings on the matter, which was forced on them by county council . against the objections of municipal officials of the two municipalities. The deer hunt was arranged on request of Halton council. Puslinch in Wellington and Beverley in Wentworth are the bnly other areas in the immediate district where hunting will be allowed.

The hunt will last four days, concluding on Saturday. Many farmers have been placarding their property with "No Hunting" signs in prepara-

tion for the invasion. Others, who enjoy hunting personally, are planning to go after their quota themselves.
