\$15,000 Raised - - \$35,000 to Go in Pool Drive

Canvass in Full Swing Swim Pool Needs \$35,000

With the community swimming pool campaign now in full swing, donations and pledges to date total \$15,500. The \$50,000 campaign has thus almost reached the one-third mark.

Donations acknowledged since last week have increased the total by \$4,000. Canvassers are still turning in their lists at headquarters, and the swimming pool committee is hopeful that the entire total will be raised within the next few weeks.

The committee has been particularly encouraged by substantial donations from a few people who have little or no connection with the town. Such a one came in the form of a \$50.00 cheque from wholesale tobacconist Peter Gorman, Newmarket, whose letter is reproduced in an advertisement in this issue of the Herald.

One thing is sure—\$35,000 is a lot of money and everyone will have to be generous to the extreme if a debt-free swimming pool is to open next spring and be available for recreation for the people of Georgetown and district. The committee hopes that everyone will do their part to help reach the needed \$50,000.

Norval Minister Talks To Cookville Rotarians

Rev. W. Edgar Gill, new minister of Norval United Church, was guest speaker recently at a meeting of Cookville Rotary Club.

Taking as his theme "To Us, The Torch" he recalled the sacrifices made so willingly by over a hundred thousand Canadian dead in two world wars and the Korean conflict, and discussed the fear-inspiring advance of the Communist slave state which in forty years has overrun 14 countries, 34 per cent of the world's land surface and 780 million people.

Chances for the survival of freedom in the world are relatively small, he said, while communist missionaries and literature goes in a flood to all non-communist countries, while Christian missionaries and literature are a trickle. They really believe in their ideology... do we believe in ours?

If we do, he said, we will increase our support of freedom projects of the Christian Church and the United Nations from a trickle to a sacrificial level, to match the sacrifices of those we honour on Remembrance Day, who died to serve this same freedom which is in grave danger today.

PROMISE 200 MORE PHONES IN TOWN BY END NOVEMBER

Another 200 households in the Georgetown area will be getting telephone service by the end of November, W. O. Miesner, Bell Telephone manager for this region, announced this week.

This expansion in service has been made possible through the installation of additional dial equipment in the Georgetown exchange building. The new facilities will be sufficient to provide telephones to a large proportion of those now waiting for service.

With Georgetown growing so rapidly, however, work will get under way almost immediately on the installation of another large dial extension to

meet the expected demand. This expansion project, which will involve the soldering of thousands of connections and the placing of miles of wire in the exchange building, will be completed by early next summer and will provide facilities to serve another 1500 telephones in the Georgetown area.

In the months to come, also, the telephone wire and cable network will be extended into the many new residential developments now being established in the Georgetown area, so that service can be provided once the enlarged dial facilities become available early next summer.
