On Monday, December 12th, 1955 at the next ensuing Municipal election you will be asked to vote for or against the following money by-laws:

**BY-LAW NO. 55-52**

Corporation of the Town of Georgetown

A By-law for the establishment of a fund amounting to One Thousand, five hundred dollars (\$1500) annually for the support and aid of the Georgetown Citizens' Band.

WHEREAS, pursuant to By-law No. 55-52 the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Georgetown has submitted to the Electors of the Town of Georgetown, qualified to vote on money by-laws according to the last revised voters' list, the following question:

"Are you for or against a By-Law for the establishment of a fund amounting to the levy of One Thousand, five hundred dollars (\$1500) annually for the support and aid of the Georgetown Citizens' Band?"

AND WHEREAS at the voting there were votes in favour of this By-Law and votes against this By-Law: NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. That for the year 1956 and thereafter a fund shall be established amounting to a levy not to exceed One Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars — (\$1500) annually for the support and aid of the Georgetown Citizens' Band.

2. That the amount which the said Band shall require out of the said fund shall be paid annually to the said band prior to the 31st day of December in each year upon resolution of the council.

**Livestock Show Standout  
At Royal 1955 Winter Fair**

The 1955 Royal Agricultural Winter Fair will no doubt go down in history as the greatest livestock show since the inception of the Royal, thirty three years ago. In so far as we could determine all available livestock space was filled to capacity. It is reported that in some cases, nurse cows had to be tied outside due to lack of accommodation. In the past we have always attempted to give some of the highlights from a Halton standpoint. However, it is impossible in one short article to cover the awards won by Halton exhibitors in that great show. Furthermore, in the day and a half which we spent at this year's Royal, it is impossible to cover all the departments of the Royal and at the same time nearly see anything. Consequently we shall confine ourselves in a very general way, to the livestock show and then perhaps we don't hurt anyone's feelings by failing to mention their awards.

Now to get back to the live stock, not only were the numbers tremendous, but the quality was equally outstanding. Many winners from county and district shows were down around the bottom in their respective classes. In short, judging by what we saw, there were few if any tail ends. In short it was no disgrace to be down around the bottom in those superb livestock classes.

Queen's Guineas

One hundred and seventy six 4 H Club members from Ontario, with their respective steers, paraded the tan bark in the ring at the Royal Coliseum on Thursday afternoon of last week. According to C. S. McKee, general manager of the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair, the Queen's Guineas classes along with the selecting of the grand champion steer in the open classes, constituted the highlights of the entire week. The Coliseum was packed to the rafters, and both were great spectacles. From a personal standpoint, the Queen's Guineas classes were terrific. Just imagine 63 club members with their Angus steers; 47 with their Hereford steers; and 66 with Shorthorns. All 176 club members wore white sweaters emblazoned with the 4-H club crest in green. And don't forget the steers were the tops from clubs all over the province. Charlie Yule, of Calgary, was again the judge. He is not only a great judge of market cattle, but his presence and conduct adds a bit of glamour as well. Halton had seven

4-H Club members in their competition— two with Angus, and five with Shorthorns. Sandy Hepburn, Lynne Coulter, Jackie Black and Douglas Campbell, all got their steers into the first prize groups and the latter had his steer pulled out as one of the 5 or 6 Shorthorns from which judge Yule selected his champion, and Reserve Champion Shorthorns. The other three Halton club members, Evelyn McKay, Don Moffat and Ian Norrish, had their steers assigned to the second prize groups. In the Angus section, Keith Campbell of Middlesex had the champion, and Bill Knight of Kent county, the Reserve. In the Hereford section, Wray McCracken, of South Simcoe had the top, and Tom Lockyer the reserve. When it came to the Shorthorns, Murray Gaunt of Huron County, a first year student in the associate course at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, had the champion Shorthorn, and Harold Major of York County the reserve. Then came the climax, the selecting of the Queen's Guineas winner the tension was terrific with hardly a sound in the huge arena.

Finally judge Charlie Yule doffed his huge Western hat and stepped Murray Gaunt's Shorthorn, and a second slap on Keith Campbell's Angus indicated the reserve. Then pandemonium broke loose — a group of Murray's fellow "Aggie" classmates rushed into the ring and hoisted him shoulder high — flash bulbs were clicking from all angles — it was a popular award. We do not know Murray Gaunt, but everyone we contacted agreed he had a terrific steer.

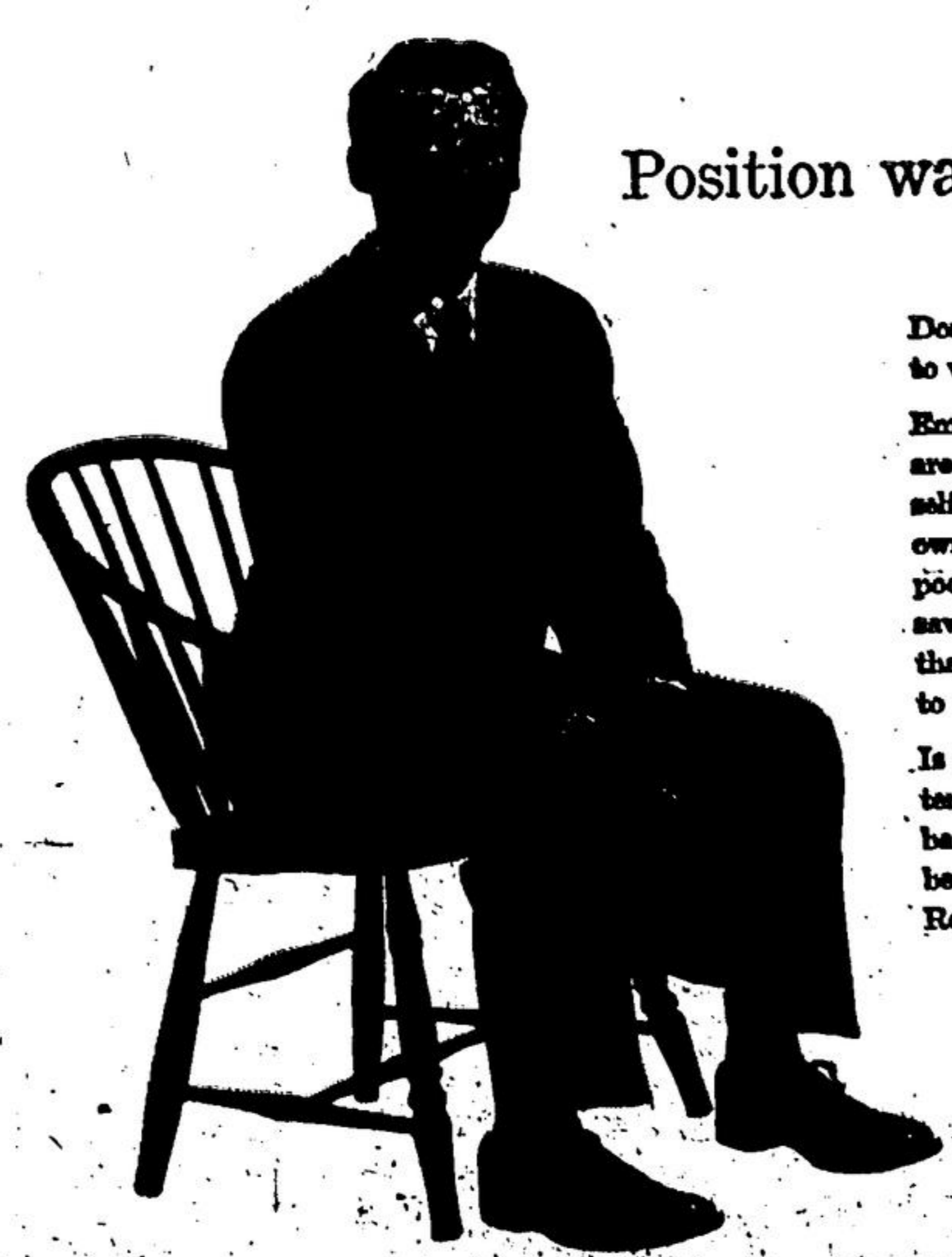
