A By law for the establishment of a fund amounting to One Thousand, five hundred dollars (\$1500) annually for the support and aid of the Georgetown Citizens' Band.

WHEREAS, pursuant to By-law No. 55 - 52 the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Georgetown has submitted to the Electors of the Town of Georgetown, qualified to vote on money By-laws according to the last revised voters' list, the following ques-

"Are you for or against a By-Law for the establishment of a fund amounting to the levy of One Thousand, five hundred dollars (\$1500) annually for the support and aid of the Georgetown Citizens'

AND WHEREAS at the voting there votes in favour of thu By-Law votes against this By-Law: NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. That for the year 1956 and thereafter a fund shall be established amounting to a levy not to exceed One Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars -(\$1500) annually for the support and aid of the Georgetown Citizens' Band.
