**FARM FORUMS DISCUSS
FIRE PREVENTION**

"Fire on the Farm": a very timely topic, was the subject discussed in Farm Radio Forum last Monday evening, November 7th.

Probably no other word in the English language fills us with horror and apprehension as much as the call: fire. The Halton farm forum groups all reported some farm fires in their locality during the past year.

In many cases farm fires are the result of carelessness. Many means of preventing them were suggested, namely: more and better inspection of electrical wiring and equipment, be sure hay is properly dried before storing; store gasoline away from the main buildings and never fill the tractor while it is running; keep chimneys, stoves and furnaces clean; store matches in a safe place out of reach of children, and never leave children alone in the house; there should be no smoking in barns and all smokers should be very careful of matches, cigarette stubs, etc.

All groups recommended having fire extinguishers handy in case a fire did start. Don't get panicky; fast action coupled with intelligence is required. Salt or baking soda is sometimes effective in controlling a fire around the kitchen range. A good supply of water near the buildings is great protection and wells may be supplemented with water from farm ponds.

Most groups reporting felt the rural people of Halton were very fortunate to have the services of different fire brigades operated by town firemen—be prepared—keep their telephone number beside your telephone.

FARM NEWS

**DROUGHT PERIODS
AND FORAGE CROPS**

Drought Periods and Forage Crops, was the subject of the interesting discussion led by Dr. W. E. Tozall, of the field husbandry department at the OAC, at the Milton public school on Tuesday evening of last week. We were particularly impressed by some data presented by Dr. Tozall regarding some work carried on at the College this past two years. Some plots of Orchard Grass, Bromo, and Meadow Fescue, had been laid down in 1954 — others with the same mixture plus Ladino Clover. A portion of the straight grass mixture was irrigated during the season received at the

sture per acre. This additional moisture doubled the yield over the non-irrigate plot. However, in the area where 2 lbs. of Ladino had been added to the grass mixture, and no irrigation, the yield tripled over the straight grass mixture without irrigation. This emphasizes the importance of some legume or legumes in the mixture. This week will see Dr. H. L. Patterson, head of the Farm Economics Branch, Toronto, leading a discussion on "The Economics of Mechanization." Then the following Tuesday night will see professor N. R. Richards, head of the soils department at the OAC, leading the discussion on the Place Commercial Fertilizers and Liming in Halton's Mixed Farming Area. The concluding session before Christmas, will be on Tuesday, Dec. 6th, when another top man, namely Prof. George E. Raithby, head of the animal husbandry department, will discuss "Zero Pasturing and The Future of the Dairy Industry in Halton". To date 76 farm operators have signed up for this timely series of meetings.
