County Rescinds Decision School Consultative Committee

After a heated discussion in which charges were hurled at various municipalities, Halton county council by a 12 to 4 vote rescinded an October resolution to set up a fact finding committee to review the North Halton High School area.

The discussion was sparked when resolutions were tabled from Acton, Nassagaweya and Esqueping opposing the establishment of such a committee. Reeve A. R. Service and Deputy Reeve Walter Linham sponsored the motion to rescind the resolution.

Warden R. H. Shannon explained various parts of the school act, emphasizing the matter rested with the county council, and that whatever the finding of the committee would be, it was still up to the municipalities and county council to make the final decision.

Reeve Stanley Allen, Georgetown, pointed out that while his municipality had requested such a committee be established, it was not the intention to split the area "but we are interested to know the facts."

"If these councils, who are opposed have a selfish motive in not wishing to know the facts, it should not be aired here at this council meeting," Reeve Allen exclaimed. "We should be happy to know all the facts but there seems to be some doubt as to know whether this is the best way to learn of the facts. I don't want to see the area changed if it is going to create a hardship on any municipality, but I urged council to establish this board," he said.

Reeve A. R. Service said this all was started to establish three school areas in the northern part of the county. "I don't think any change should be made when the three opposing municipalities are paying well over fifty per cent of present cost," he said.

"I don't think this request came from the North Halton High School Board, but the Urban Board, arising out of the request of the Milton Public School Board, who were anxious to change the Milton High School for public school purposes," Reeve Service charged.

Reeve Wilfrid Bird, Esqueping, read an invitation received from the Milton Public School Board to attend a meeting, which Esqueping members declined to attend. It was called to discuss the sale of the school which Esqueping was opposed to.

"We had no idea something else was to be discussed. They wanted to sell the school for \$25,000 and it is insured for \$250,000, and that is not

ted: "I cannot understand how the opposing municipalities know all the facts, even if it is working satisfactorily. This area was set up 10 or 12 years ago and was an experiment, with the thought of building a school at Speyside. Now it would appear reasonable to review the situation to see if there was a better way to economically serve the educational need in the northern area. The only way we will find this out is to form this committee."

During discussion, members from the southern area felt the board's jurisdiction should include the whole of the county. Others felt it should be held over until another meeting until all school boards and councils were informed of council's deliberations on the high school question.

Reeve Martin further explained there was no reflection cast on any of the high schoolboards in the county but after the committee made its report, it was up to county council to adopt it, or reject it.

Council rejected a second resolution sponsored by Reeves Allen and Martin, who sought to have a fact-finding committee established to review the high school situation within the whole of the county and members be appointed at the next meeting.
