## Linham, Currie Acclaimed No Election in Esquemas

Esquemas has a new reeve and deputy this year, but there will be no election and no change in faces on the township council.

All offices were filled by acclamation at Monday's nomination meeting in the community hall at Stewarttown. Reeve Wilfrid Bird stepped out of office, but was elected a councillor. Deputy Walter Linham moved up to the reeve's seat; Cr. George Currie, a past county warden who has served terms as reeve on two separate occasions, became deputy; and Crs. Campbell Sinclair and Spencer Wilson were re-elected.

Chairman R. J. Cunningham was re-elected to the school area board, with two new members, Clarence Coles and Vernon Jacobs. The retiring members, William Dobbin and Arthur Riddell, who were appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late John Riddell, declined to run, as did Edwin Harrop, a past member of council who was nominated for council again. J. P. Kirkwood and C. W. Taylor have another year of their school board term to serve.

## Moffat Hunter Wounded Deer Attacks Local Man

A telephone survey of several districts here this week reveals at least 30 deer shot in Esquemas and Neagawaga during the four-day open season last week. It is certain that the deer population was reduced by close to a hundred, as it was impossible to contact all district hunters, aside from those who came from farther centres to join the hunt.

Two casualties were reported. Walter Freeman, 43, of Campbellville, was hit by a stray bullet while hunting south of Moffat. The bullet struck his left hip and a fellow hunter rushed him to Guelph General Hospital. P/C Howard Gunn of Milton OPP detachment, said another hunter shot at the deer from the opposite direction.

A most unusual experience was that of Tony Martin, 27 Henry St., who is nursing a gashed leg. He was hunting alone at Silvercreek near the old reservoir and bagged a 200 lb. 7-point buck. Thinking the animal finished, he left his gun against a tree, and went to examine his catch. The dying animal shook his head and apparently caught Mr. Martin's knee with an antler. The wounded man applied a tourniquet and was assisted from the scene by a group of passing hunters. He was taken to hospital where the wound required stitches.

Largest organized party was composed of Hornby men who hunted near Speyside and No. 10 sideroad. Their catch totalled a dozen. Gord Lee, Ward Brownridge, and Doug Leslie shot two each, and Jack Clayton, Glenn Saunders, Jack Simpson, Bob Fasken, Murray Hayward and Arnold Howden each brought down one. The 9 bucks and 3 does ranged in weight from 100 to 200 lbs. Other party members included Alf Bridgen, Dunc Robinson, Spencer Wilson, Don Houston, Charlie Austin, Bill Robinson, Bill Anderson, Percy Leslie, Andy Anderson, Harry, Ed and Fred Robertson. The hunters were approached many times during the four days by department wardens, who were doing a good job controlling the hunt.

A dozen men who also hunted at Speyside shot 3 one day and added another the next. Their party included Newt, Jack, Fred and Frank Ruddell, Roy Christian, Melford Fenwick, Jack Lawson, Jim, Bruce and Donald Ismond, Jack Roberts, Orangeville and Bert Richardson, Toronto.

Cliff Found, of the local police force, shot the only deer when he hunted with Norm Hladysch and Tracy Barrager. Another Georgetown, Art Suddaby, while out with Bob Darou, also removed a deer from Speyside.

William Carhart, his son Norman and Casey Bos hunted in Mr. Carhart's own bush at Stewarttown and each of the Carharts got a deer.

Hunting near Silvercreek with a 10-man group. Hugh Leslie shot a six-point buck, while Doug Reid also got a buck.

A 10 man Glen Williams party each took home half a deer, when their total take was 3 does and 2 bucks. The hunters were Lorne and Harvey Garvin, Henry Shepherd, Harold and Gerry Ingila, Harry Logan, Ed Martin, Norm McAlpine, Gord McLean and Bill Orpen.

Another 10 man party, mostly Novar men, totalled 6 deer, with Wes Louth and Stay Eyre shooting two each, Percy Donaldson, and Ed Bailey each one. Their group included Jack Smith, Cliff McDonald, Walt Louth and Bill Elliott, Milton. They were hunting on West's farm near Milton mountain.

Clare Wilson brought down two deer while hunting with Russ McClure at Speyside. His tuck came after three days without sighting one animal.

## Drowns When Plane Crashes in Pacific

Only son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Thompson, Ingleton, he lived with his family at the Glen for two years after they emigrated from England. He was employed at Avro before joining the RCAF a few months ago. He was first stationed at Clinton, then posted to Toronto.

## Seek Better Garbage Collection at Sunbeam

A number of citizens were present at Monday night's council meeting to present problems for consideration.

Sid Hardie and Ronald Perry who live in the Sunbeam Heights subdivision had several complaints to put before council, stemming from the recent meeting of the newly formed Ratepayers' Association of that area. As spokesmen for the citizens who have bought homes there, Mr. Hardie said that one of their prime annoyances at the moment is the garbage collection. It is supposed to be collected on Monday, but for the past three weeks at least, it hasn't been picked up on that day. Mr. Hardie contended it was not hygienic to leave it sitting in the streets for long periods, nor was it a credit to the town. He urged that a definite time for collection be set down and adhered to.

Councillor Hale, who is public works chairman, replying to Mr. Hardie said that he had had two calls from Shelley Street residents last week with similar complaints. It is the third week such conditions have occurred. Mr. Hale said he had discussed the situation with Mr. Lane who had promised him a new schedule would be drawn up eliminating the trouble. Nothing appears to have been done, so Mr. Hale assured Mr. Hardie he would contact Mr. Lane again.

Mayor Armstrong said that the garbage situation had only two possible solutions. Either the collector would have to get more equipment, or set up a new schedule of collection so that householders would know definitely when it is to be collected. He asked Mr. Hale for a report on the matter at the next meeting. (Garbage collection in this area has since been changed to Fridays.)

The second point Mr. Hardie brought up concerned the condition of the roads in Sunbeam Heights. It is very hard to get in and out of the driveways on Prince Charles Drive and Shelley Street. The construction company is still in charge of the roads in that area, but council instructed town engineer to notify the construction company to rectify the condition of the roads immediately.

Bob Wyatt and Mrs. Fred Sinclair also addressed council regarding the drainage problem on property on the corner of Main Street and Henry Street, which Mr. Wyatt has purchased from Mrs. Sinclair. Water from Cloverdale Heights drains into the backyard of the property, and at the front the drainage down the highway

## Council Approves \$42,000 Municipal Building Plan

The reading and passing of several by-laws occupied a large portion of Monday's council meeting. The most important of these was the final reading of the by-law authorizing the remodelling and enlarging of the Municipal building at an estimated cost of \$42,800.

A by-law was passed for payment of \$242.00 to the Hydro Electric Power Commission which is payment for two or three small parcels of land in the Delreux subdivision. These are bits of land on what was formerly the old radial track which interfere with the planned streets and roads in Delreux, namely on Rexway Drive, Prince Charles Drive and Sargent Road, these passageways crossing the former radial trackway at one point. The town will be reimbursed for this expenditure by Delreux.

By-laws were read and passed to authorize the issuance of debentures for \$501.24 to extend the sewer line in Parkview Blvd; for \$4384.34 for installation of sanitary sewers on Shelley Street, a length of 1485 feet; also for the amount of \$5731.05 to instal 8" water mains on Prince Charles Drive from Edward Street, a distance of 700 feet.

By-laws were also passed for debentures covering the cost of construction of 8" water mains for 1485 feet along Shelley Street at a cost of \$5085.82; also for \$980.22 which is the cost of sidewalks to be put in on Arletta Street; for 6" water mains on Lorne Street and Churchill Crescent at a cost of \$1035.94; and for \$6387.47 which is the cost of installing sanitary sewers on Edward Street from Byron to Guelph Street.

Installation of a 10" water main on John Street from the existing 12" line to Mountainview Road, thence South to River Drive, a distance of 1900 feet at an estimated cost of \$16,210 was authori-

Main Street merchant James Goodlett presented a petition to council at Monday's meeting, signed by well over 90 per cent of the merchants located on Main, Mill and Wexleyan Sts. to have the two hour parking limit by-law strictly enforced during business hours in the streets.

Mayor Armstrong recalled that some time ago, Charles Wray had approached council with a similar request, but at that time it was the opinion of council that when the by-law was strictly enforced, it did not have the favour of all the businessmen. "But it now appears that very nearly all the businessmen want its enforcement, and if that is their desire, it should be," was the stated opinion of the mayor. He suggested that chairman of the police committee, Cr. Walter Gray, instruct the police that beginning a week from today the by-law limiting the hours of parking be enforced to the letter.

In order to do this, a motion had to be presented to amend the present parking by-law drawing up the hours of enforcement of the two hour parking period to correspond with the change in open night from Saturday to Friday night. Thus the parking on Main, Mill and Wexleyan Streets will be allowed for only two hour periods from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday; from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. on Thursday, and from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Friday. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Goodlett thanked council, and in so doing mentioned that never in his experience had a petition been so eagerly signed by everyone approached, because all merchants realized that enforcing the parking by-law rigidly was one way to alleviate the acute parking problem in the town's business section.

A street light will be installed at the corner of Dufferin and Main Sts. It will be placed on the second pole from the corner.

Reeve Stan Allen asked that "No Parking from here to corner" signs be put on both Draper and George Streets where they intersect. There has been considerable delay in the shipment of "Stop" and "No Parking" signs which were ordered several months ago. As soon as they arrive, they will be placed immediately in the most necessary locations, including the corner specified by the reeve.

A "Stop" sign will also be erected at the intersection of Albert and McNab Streets, and also at the corner of Market and Mill Streets.

In response to an inquiry from the town, a letter from a firm of surveyors, Bowman, Black and Shoemaker, was read stating that their survey of the properties which changed hands between the town and R. Lane had been surveyed by them as a result of instructions received in a telephone call from Mr. E. Hyde on Tuesday, March 29th. On Thursday, March 31, they met Mr. Hyde and Mr. Lane on the property and received definite instructions at that time as to limits of each parcel of land requiring a survey.

The mayor instructed the clerk to have on hand for the next meeting all the data in connection with the land transaction between Mr. Lane and the town.

A bill for \$5,851.25 was received from the Township of Esquemas, being the amount of taxes payable to the township by the town as per their agreement last fall when the town annexed part of the township land. The total assessment was \$17,000 at a rate of 30.3 mills, plus the fire area (Continued on Page 8)

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
