Moffat Hunter Wounded Deer Attacks Local Man

A telephone survey of several district men this week reveals at least 36 deer shot in Esquesing and Nassagaweys during the four-day open season last week. It is certain that the deer population was reduced by close to a hundred, as it was impossible to contact all district hunters, aside from those who came from farther centries to join the hunt.

Two casualties were reported. Walter Freeman, 43, of Campbellville, was hit by a stray bullet while hunting south of Moffat. The bullet struck his left hip and a fellow hunter rushed him to Guelph General Hospital. PC Howard Gunn of Milton OPP detachment, said another hunter shot at the deer from the opposite dir-

ection. A most unusual experience was that of Tony Martin, 27 Henry St., who is nursing a gashed leg. He was hunting alone at Silvercreek near the old reservoir and bagged a 200 lb. 7-point buck. Thinking the animal finished, he left his gun against a tree, and went to examine his catch. The dying animal shook his head and apparently caught Mr. Martin's knee with an antler. The wounded man applied a tourniquet and was assisted from the scene by a group of passing hunters. He was taken to hospital where the

wound required stitches. Largest organized party was composed of Hornby men who hunted near Speyside and No. 10 sideroad. Their catch totalled a dozen. Seek Better Garbage Collection at Sunbeam

A number of citizens were present

at Monday night's council meeting to present problems for consideration. Sid Hardie and Ronald Perry who live in the Sunbeam Heights subdivi- water, Mr. Wyatt claimed. before council, stemming from the recent meeting of the newly formed Ratepayers' Association of that area, As spokesman for the citizens who have bough homes there, Mr. Hardie said that one of their prime annoyances at the momen is the garbage collection. It is supposed to be collected on Monday, but for the past three weeks at least. It hasn't been picked up on that day. Mr. Hardie contended it was not hypenic to leave it sitting in the streets for long periods. nor was it a credit to the town. He urged that a definite time for collec-

tion be set down and adhered to. Councillor Hale, who is public works chairman, replying to Mr. Hardie said that he had had two calls from Shelley Street residents week with similar complaints. It is the third week such conditions have occurred. Mr. Hale said he had discussed the situation with Mr. Lane who had promised him a new schedule would be drawn up eliminating the trouble. Nothing appears to have been done, so Mr. Hale assured Mr. Hardie he would contact Mr. Lane ag-

Mayor Armstrong said that the garbage situation had only two possible solutions. Either the collector would have to get more equipment, or set up a new schedule of collection so that householders would know definitely when it is to be collected. He asked Mr. Hale for a report on the matter at the next meeting. (Garbage collection in this area has since been changed to Fridays.)

The second point Mr. Hardie brought up concerned the condition of the roads in Sunbeam Heights. It is very hard to get in and out of the driveways on Prince Charles Drive and Shelley Street. The construction company is still in charge of the roads in that area, but council instructed town engineer to notify the construction company to rectify the con-

dition of the roads immediately. Bob Wyatt and Mrs. Fred Sinclair also addressed council regarding the drainage problem on property on the corner of Main Street and Henry Street, which Mr. Wyatt has purchased from Mrs. Sinclair. Water from Cloverdale Heights drains into the backyard of the property, and at the front the drainage down the highway turns into Henry Street and forms a pool at the side of the house. The storm sewer recently installed there merely deflects the course of the

the proposed solution of the drainage problem in his back yard by filling it up. If that were done he would lose some valuable fruit trees and bushes. He would like to avoid this situation if at all possible.

Council referred to Engineer Wilson for advice on this problem. Mr. Wilson said that by the time the grading on the highway which runs in the front of Mr. Wyatt's house is finished, which should be in a day or so, the drainage at the front of the house would be all right. With regard to the back yards, he explained that the town couldn't put in a catch basin without lowering the storm sewer all along Guelph Street at a great deal of expense. Engineer Wilson said that in his opinion if the backyard were filled in to a depth of two feet only, the problem would be solved. In that way also the trees and shrubs on the property would not be

In response to Mrs. Sinclair's query as to what type of fill would be used. Mr. Wilson replied that top soil would be put on top of it so that the garden would not suffer. Mrs. Sinclair also wished assurance that drainage of water from the north of the property which is a problem in a heavy rain be looked after. Mr. Wilson promised that it would also be attended to.

Ben Judge, who lives in an apartment on Queen Street, was present at the meeting to ask council's help or advice in regard to the heating situation in the apartment building. There are no storm windows installed as had been promised, and there is not sufficient heat in the building. The mayor said the best he could do in the situation was to refer him to the county health unit. He instructed the clerk to write to the Unit who will send an inspector around to the premises. The temperature in a heated house in rented premises must be up to a certain level.

Main Street merchant James Goodlet presented a petition to council at Monday's meeting, signed by well over 90 per cent of the merchants located on Main, Mill and Wesleyan Sts. to have the two hour parking limit by law strictly enforced during business hours in the streets.

"Mayor Armstrong recalled that some time ago, Charles Wrey had approsched council with a similar request, but at that time it was the opinion of council that when the by-law was strictly enforced, it did not have the favour of all the businessmen "But it now appears that very nearly all the businessmen want its enforcement, and if that is their desire, it should be," was the stated opinion of the mayor. He suggested that chairman of the police committee, Cr. Walter Gray, instruct the police that beginning a week from today the bylaw limiting the hours of parking be enforced to the letter.

In order to do this, a motion had to be presented to amend the present parking by law drawing up the hours of enforcement of the two hour parking period to correspond with the change in open night from Saturday to Friday night. Thus the parking on Main, Mill and Wesleyan Streets will be allowed for only two hour periods from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday; from 9.a.m. to 12 pm. on Thursday, and from 9 a.m. to 9 pm on Friday The motion passed unanimously.

Mr Goodlet thanked council, and in so doing mentioned that never in his experience had a petition been so cagerly signed by everyone approach ed, because all merchants realized that enforcing the parking by law rigidly was one way to alleviate the acute parking problem in the town's business section.

A street light will be installed at the corner of Dufferin and Main Sts. It will be placed on the second pole from the corner.

Reeve Stan Allen asked that "No Parking from here to corner" signs be put on both Draper and George Streets where they intersect. There has been considerable delay in the shipment of "Stop" and "No Parking" signs which were ordered several months ago. As soon as they arrive, they will be placed immediately in the most necessary locations, including the corner specified by the reeve.

A "Stop" sign will also be erected at the intersection of Albert and Me-Nab Streets, and also at the corner of Market and Mill Streets.
