rate of 5.3 mills on the building assessment alone (\$107,125), amounting to \$567.76. The total payment due on December 15th is \$5,851.25.

Cr. Irwin Noble, chairman of veterans' affairs, reported he had been in touch with the Legion regarding the plaque for Korean war veterans to be placed on the monument. There will also be a flag placed in the arena.

Council as a group commended the Board of Parks Management on the fine job they have done remodelling the arena.

Several improvement ideas were voiced at the conclusion of the meeting. One of these came from Cr. Thomas Lyons who suggested that next year's council erect a fence around the reservoir property to protect it from trespassers and thus make the area safe for the storing of town equipment. He had made a survey of what it had cost the town last year to keep the property in proper repair, cleaned out, and in running order and discovered it had amounted to \$2,000.

Reeve Allen said that in his opinion next year's council should seriously consider setting up a municipally operated garbage collection system as the only really permanent solution to control garbage collection difficulties.

Engineer Doug Wilson suggested that a way to eliminate the hazard of slippery hills for drivers might be to install boxes of sand and salt at the base of big hills, marked for the use of the public in icy weather. Council gave him permission to investigate the cost of such a procedure.

Cr. Gray was authorized to make a survey of Prince Charles Drive, Shelley Street and part of Byron Street, with hydro superintendent Gerry McCallum, to estimate the number of street lights which will be needed when the town takes over those roads.
