Another problem. Our driver offered to take us to a restaurant where they would cash our cheque and we thanked him believing our troubles were over.

discovered it was a night club. Nice but nothing dramatic. Just a lady at a piano playing and singing. It was good music - some French. some Italian and some English. The lights were dim and they were singing that beautiful Italian song Santa Lucia when our driver came back after parking his taxi. We invited him to a meal with us as we were glad at last to have got settled.

Friends! Have you ever heard that song about "the girl I took to dinner?" . . . we ordered a moderate meal for ourselves, but not being able to understand Prench we allowed dur driver to order his own. Here is his order. One whole lobster garnished with all the trimmings. It came on a huge platter. Our driver ate the lobster with relish but disdained to even look at the trimmings. Shen the very polite waiter removed the platter and replaced it with a whole chicken likewise with trimmings. I wondered if he would every stop! Finally he did and the waiter brought the the bill. I started to write out a cheque for \$20.00 but realized that was not enough. I had to cash three \$30.00 cheques to cover the bill for one night Now every time I hear the song Santa Lucis I shall remember my "Night in Paris."

We stayed another two or three days in Paris visiting the shops, etc. but I wanted to get back to dear old England, so we said goodbye to Paris and left for the docks at Lellavre -- Kay Cordaro
