Margaret Annie Osborne Dies After Lengthy Illness: St. John's Hears of Moral Rearmament

After a long illness, Margaret Annie Osborne, daughter of the late John Osborne and Lettie Aha Mullis, died on Wednesday, November 30th, at the Guelph General Hospital. Her last severe illness came in the form of a stroke.

Although she was born in Glen Williams, the late Miss Osborne was taken to live at the home of her aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. William Sloan at their farm home on the town line when only an infant, when her mother died. She lived there all her life until she moved to Glen Williams nine years ago.

Miss Osborne worked at Apple Products Ltd. for over ten years, and more recently was an employee of the Hammond Knitting Mills. She was a member of Union Presbyterian Church. For the past year her second cousin, Mrs. Howard Garvin had been caring for her during her illness.

Miss Osborne's only brother Jack, died ten years ago. Her last surviving relative and first cousin, William Sahli, predeceased her last spring.

Rev. G. L. Royal of Union Church, conducted the funeral service held at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home at 2 p.m. Friday, December 2nd. Pall bearers were Sam Mackenzie, George Leslie, Wilfrid Leslie, Lorne Garvin, Vern Thompson and Clifford Cook. Interment took place in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.

St. John's Hears of Moral Rearmament

Members of St. John's United Church congregation had the privilege on Sunday morning of hearing a leading figure in International Moral Rearmament speak to them.

Dick Stollery who with his wife and son Kenneth has been visiting with the Bob Souther family, is returning from a tour of Europe and Asia and intends to spend the winter at Mackinac Island, Michigan, the American MRA centre. Mr. Stollery is Mrs. Souther's brother. It is a coincidence that Rev. Morgan McFarlane was a classmate of college in Saskatoon, and it was through their friendship that such an outstanding speaker appeared in the pulpit.

Mr. Stollery has been serving in Europe, particularly in France. This summer he visited India, Pakistan, Burma and the Philippines in connection with his work.

He told people on Sunday that today's international unrest is an ideological struggle for men's hearts and minds. Russia's current interest in India recalls Lenin's statement thirty years ago that the way to London and Washington is through China and India.

He described MRA as the commitment of life to serve God under the direction of the holy spirit, using as a standard four absolutes, honesty, purity, unselfishness and love. The theory is unpalatable to Russia, and he said Russian broadcasts to India have been bitter against MRA.

He decried the few dollars given to Christian missions, when the communists draw on a third of the world's resources in the battle of ideology.

HIGH SCHOOL CHOIR SINGS AT ST. JOHN'S

On Sunday evening the Georgetown High School Choir, under the direction of Kenneth R. Harrison, ARCT, RMT, made their annual visit to St. John's United Church for the evening service. The choir led the singing for the service very beautifully. The girls in the choir sang "A Cradle Song" by Haydn. Mitchell Armstrong's solo was "In the Stillness of the Night." The choir as a whole sang two anthems "Jesu Bambino," and Old Spanish Carol and "God rest you merry gentlemen" — the old English carol.

Rev. Morgan McFarlane, in his welcome to the choir and congregation said how fortunate we in Georgetown were, having such talented young people and to have such a capable director to train them and we are sure that his remarks were fully appreciated by those present. We are indeed fortunate.

Mr. McFarlane's sermon theme was "The Indispensable Saviour." In this he impressed on the congregation the fact that in everything one does, no matter how large or small our basis must be the Saviour.

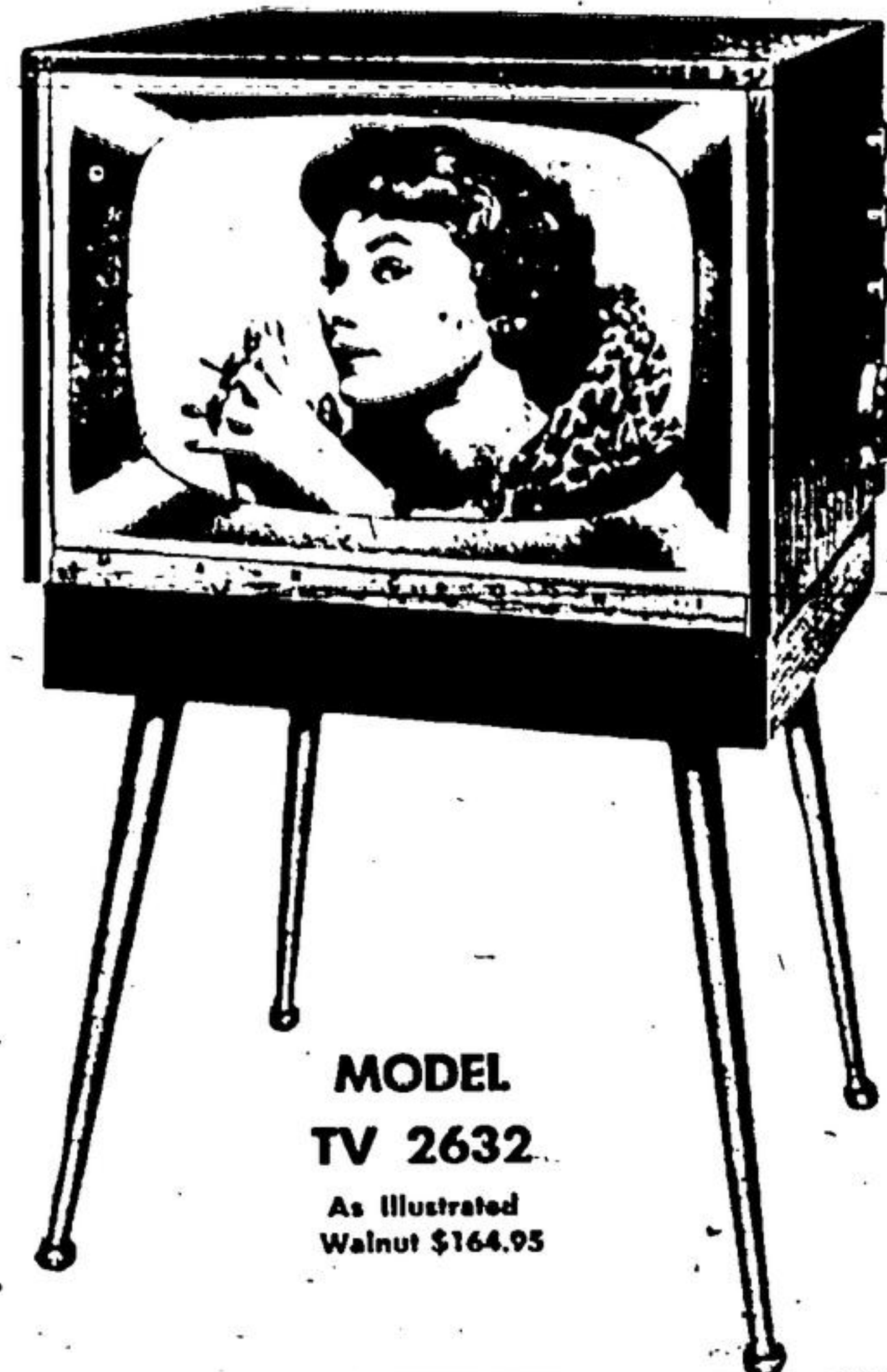
