**Peel Memorial Hospital
Seeks Members Donations**

The public relations committee of the Peel Memorial Hospital Board is making its annual appeal for members.

A year ago three hundred and eighty (380) community minded citizens enrolled as members of the Peel Memorial Hospital Association for 1955.

That was a record enrollment and was most gratifying. It was a real morale booster for the Board of Governors, who were greatly encouraged in their voluntary work by such a tangible manifestation of support for this essential community institution of healing.

However, gratified as they were, it is the feeling of the present Brampton Board that because of the increased population of the town of Brampton and the area now being served by this hospital, many more men and women should be identified in this way with Peel Memorial and its activities.

With this in mind Five Hundred (500) is the membership objective set for 1956. That means that in addition to all 380 this year's members renewing their membership, a minimum of 120 new members should enroll.

If you and other members of your family and household are already members you are asked to renew your membership for 1956.

If not now a member, you are requested to give the matter serious consideration. The annual fee is only \$2.00 per person. \$4.00 will cover the memberships of man and wife. \$10 will enroll a family or household of five.

The money thus received is helpful, but it is your personal and moral support which the Board is seeking primarily in this appeal for more members.

The year 1956 promises to be an exceptionally active one at Brampton hospital. With the awarding last week of the contract for the necessary extension to the existing boiler room and the installation of one new boiler, the long anticipated expansion programme will soon be underway. The architects, John B. Parkin and Associates, in collaboration with Mr. Gordon Friesen, the hospital's consultant, are now busy preparing sketch plans and as soon as these along with a rough estimate of cost, have been checked by the joint committee, and approved by the Board, you will be made fully acquainted with the overall expansion plans and

the details of the entire building programme.

To delay longer in solving the serious overcrowding problem at the hospital, would be to neglect our duty to this ever-growing community and unfair to our fellow citizens who require the services of this humanitarian institution in greater numbers every year.

By enrolling as a member of the Peel Memorial Hospital Association for 1956, you strengthen the hands of the Board of Governors and indicate that they have your personal backing in their exceptionally heavy duties during expansion year, and furthermore demonstrate in a most practical way that the time and effort given so freely and generously by them in the interest of the hospital is appreciated by you as a citizen of the community which the hospital serves.

"We kept on playing cards but I'm sure we didn't lose him. This kind of setback is anticipated by the underground. What's more, our visit was becoming more and more of a strain on the family rations. This family couldn't afford to patronize the black market so we all went a bit hungry all the time.

The Black Market in occupied territory wasn't illegal in the accepted sense but more of a necessary evil. Both French and German went there, anyone who could spend \$24 for a pound of butter or \$2 for an egg. It wasn't unusual to see a Nazi major queuing up behind a French peasant at the black market in a barn or other large building. It was part of the German scheme of things for this particular area that the residents be treated in a moderately civilized manner. This is why the Germans lined up behind the French instead of barging to the head of the queue. An irregular tax was collected from the farmer by the Germans, too. It took the form of a percentage cut on grain and cattle produced and it wasn't totally unreasonable.

"The odd rabbit was caught to help feed Bob and me so our meals weren't hopeless but we weren't gaining any weight on the diet. The meat from the black market was often mouldy so we didn't miss much there. At the same time our meals were certainly causing a drain on the household supply.

Hopes Dashed
"But rations or no rations, we'd probably been reported to the Germans so something had to be done about us. A few days later a priest came to the house. He told us we were on our way back to England — and for emphasis he yanked a big .45-calibre automatic out from under his robe and waved it under our noses. We said goodbye to our benefactors, left them three of our compasses, and, after an argument, persuaded them to take some of our escape money as a token of appreciation.

"Then we left. When we got outside we received a bit of a shock. The priest told us that we weren't going back to England as he'd said earlier. He explained that our hostess had been too talkative and that he'd heard about the two Canadian flyers as far away as a village 20 miles from this town. The story about shipping us back to England was just a ruse to keep the woman from giving away any more secrets.

"So, for the time being we were billeted with a frightened old couple in a small town in the area where the Germans had quarters. We had to stay indoors all the time.

"One day we heard shooting. Outside the Germans were running about and peeking out from behind trees and shooting off their rifles in every direction. It didn't make sense. A few minutes after the shooting began, some soldiers headed for our house and we dashed around searching for a place to hide. Finally, out of desperation we ran upstairs and hid in the loft like attic. We could still watch the excitement through cracks between the walls and the eaves. The Germans came right into the house and started up the stairs.
